FOREST GROVE VOTES FOR SALOON MEN

Forest Grove's city election yesterday resulted in a victory for the saloon li-cense ticket, by majorities ranging from 90 on city marshal to 31 off mayor. The campaign was warm. The total vots was 328, of which Walter Hogs, anti-saloon candidate for mayor, received 144, and his opponent, C. N. Johnson, got 174. A peculiar phase of the liquor issue was that the saloon ticket was designated "anti-fron house." The vot-ers who favored this ticket were for the liquor business but against its being carried on in a certain building located in an out of the way place on the rear-end of a block. The three anti-fron house candidates for councilmen B. H. Laughlin, C. W. McNamer and John Cor-nellus, were elected by majorities of 45, 80 and 35 respectively. M. G. King, anti-iron house candidate for treasurer, was on both tickets. F. W. Cronin, anti-iron house candidate for marshal, was elected by 20 votes over John A. Briplin.



(Journal Special Service.) Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 10.—William J. Bryan, who attended the inauguration of Governor Folk, addressed the legisla-ture on invitation of the Republican house. Mr. Bryan congratulated Mis-souri upon the election of Folk and said that he favored municipal ownership of public institutions to do away with de-moralising corporation influences in poli-tics. He praised Roosevelt for commen-dations made in his message and predicted a stranuous life for Roosevelt during the next four years if he attempted to really curb the power of the railroads.
