

APPROPRIATION IS NOT YET SETTLED

Rivers and Harbors Committee Still Favor Cutting Out Cello Canal.

FULTON WILL BE HEAD OF CLAIMS COMMITTEE

New Building at Exposition to House the Filipino and Alaskan Exhibits.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 21.—The river and harbor committee has not yet agreed upon appropriations for the improvements of the rivers and harbors of Oregon, but will probably decide upon these items at the next meeting.

Considerable discussion has been indulged in over the proposed canal between The Dalles and Celilo, but because of the various opinions as to the merits of this work, it has been impossible to reach any agreement.

Apparently the committee is willing to appropriate just so much for the Columbia river and is endeavoring to force the Oregon delegation to say whether that money shall be expended in continuing improvements at the mouth of the river or to be used in the construction of the proposed ship canal.

Naturally the delegation is reluctant about expressing a preference, a small committee is evidently satisfied that the mouth of the river should be improved, and if left to its own discretion will probably authorize the expenditure of the proposed appropriation in completing the jetty, now under construction.

Senator Fulton, by reason of changes that will occur in the senate after March 4, will find himself in line for succession to the chairmanship of the committee on claims, now held by Warren of Wyoming.

Warren will become chairman of the public buildings and grounds committee, Clapp will get the Indian affairs committee, McCumber probably retain the pension committee and Allen does not want the chairmanship of the claims committee.

The only other senator ranking Fulton is Burton of Kansas and on account of his entanglement will not be given this position. Unless something unforeseen occurs, Fulton at the beginning of the next congress will become chairman of this very important committee.

At the request of the Lewis and Clark expedition authorities, Senator Fulton today requested the treasury department to make some provision for housing the Philippine exhibit at Portland.

It develops that there is no room in the Government building for this exhibit, so it has been decided to erect a small building in the rear of the Government building, in which the forestry and irrigation exhibit will be installed.

The Philippine exhibit will be made in the building along with the exhibit from Alaska.

Opposer Game Preserves. Representative Mendell today filed a dissenting report on the bill creating game preserves within forest reservations.

He opposes the bill on the ground that it takes from the states their constitutional rights to control fish and game within their borders and transfers this authority to the secretary of the interior.

THE REACTION TO TRY THE SENATOR

Portland, Jan. 21.—To the Editor of The Journal.—This morning's Oregonian contains a statement purporting to come from Washington to the effect that Senator Mitchell will return here to insist upon an early trial because information has reached him that the prosecution is in no hurry to bring him to trial, and that an official very closely connected with the prosecution of the land-fraud cases is said to have advised friends in this city that Senator Mitchell would not be brought to trial for at least a year.

If any person made such a statement, it is utterly without foundation. The prosecution refrained from causing the arrest of either Senator Mitchell or Congressman Hermann because both of them expressed anxiety to reach Washington to attend to public business.

As the next term of court will commence on the 10th day of April, 1905, and as neither Senator Mitchell nor Congressman Hermann indicated any desire to return here for trial prior to the next term of court, Judge Bellinger discharged the jurors in attendance upon this term of court on January 19.

The newspapers had previously announced that Senator Mitchell might take his seat, and that Congressman Hermann had already taken his seat. As prosecuting officer, I concluded to await the adjournment of congress before pressing their case for trial.

I am ready and more than willing to give each of these gentlemen a speedy trial, and the prosecution will urge the trial of their cases at the earliest day the court can take them up in the next term, commencing April 10, 1905, and no postponement whatever will be asked for by the government.

I am more anxious to complete the trial of these cases and return to my own private business than Senator Mitchell or any other defendant can possibly be to obtain a trial.
