

AT WAR OVER CHANGE
Racing Engagements at New York Are to Be Transferred From Morris to Belmont.

THE STATES OF NEW JERSEY AND PENNSYLVANIA MAY BE ADDED TO RACING ASSOCIATION.

General Special Service.
New York, Jan. 27.—While New York racing men have been watching and talking about the dispute over racing dates in the west, which may develop into a serious racing war, a back-up over dates has developed in our own midwest so to speak, which while it has not developed into anything like a war, has all the same, given the racing power more than one unpleasant quarter of an hour, and will give them many more before it is straightened out.

It all comes about through the building of Belmont park and the transfer to the new track of the racing engagements of the Washington racing association. Mr. Belmont, who is the head of the new enterprise, wants the dates set aside for the Morris park track heretofore, but Dan Henderson Morris says he wants those dates for the New York Jockey club. If his claim that the dates of a right belong to the track and not to the association, then the only way dates can be assigned for the Belmont park track is by cutting down the allotment of the other metropolitan concerns, and each of those declares that they have not a day they can spare, inasmuch as the racing period in this state is limited by law. The season cannot be extended, even if any of the recognized tracks wanted dates before or after the present season, which they do not.

There is some talk of the courts being called on, but this probably will not be the case.
It is the sincere wish of eastern racing men that the western racing could be cleared up without a fight, but there seems to be little hope for this consummation. In fact, news from sources which may be considered reliable is to the effect that racing will begin at the Panama track in a few months, and with a first class lot of horses, I understand that the new jockey club will be formally organized next week, and that it will certainly include Panama track, New Orleans, River Park, Hot Springs, Churchill Downs, Louisville, Hawthorne and Worth and perhaps Washington park, Chicago, with Lexington, Nashville, Kansas City, and Union City, St. Louis, among its members. With such a list the new organization will be a powerful one. If the war does not become too bitter, it is thought here that about one year of fighting will settle all hands and a season a compromise will be reached.

New Jersey and Pennsylvania may soon be added to the list of racing states.
Understand that in both states bills are being introduced which will begin to effect the model of the New York state law, and with fair chance of success in both. I am inclined to believe if such action is taken in New Jersey two or more states will be added to the list of racing states.
In Pennsylvania both Philadelphia and Pittsburgh could easily support first class tracks and the big game racing. The effect of Jerome's late crusade against gambling is to put the army of tourists, which infest this city, in the way of having to go to work if there is not a let up pretty soon. What use has the honest citizen for the "sure thing" so liberally advertised if there is no place to play it?

For several months there has been considerable talk of Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas breaking into the racing game. It is true that he has contemplated such a move and has taken in several head of runners but he will make no particular effort for the present. Bailey is a "rich man's game" and claims not to have enough ready cash to make a success of it. According to his notions, as expressed during his last visit to Lexington, Ky., he thinks that for a man to make a success at breeding thoroughbreds he must have at least \$100,000 which he is prepared to sink in it, a stallion of great reputation and at least a score of high class, well bred brood mares to begin with. With such a foundation, Senator Bailey declares, it would be useless to compete against such established breeders as J. B. Hagen, owner of the Rancho del Pico and Elmhurst studs, August Belmont of the Nursery stud, R. Keene, of the Castleton stud, Milton Young of the McClellan stud and others of that class.
