

GOVERNOR'S PALACE BLOWN UP BY BOMB

Trepoff Escapes, Not Being at Home When the Explosion Occurs.

ALL STRIKERS RETURN TO WORK IN ST. PETERSBURG

Moscow and Polish Cities Declared to Be in a Minor State of Siege.

(Journal Special Service.) St. Petersburg, Jan. 29.—A dynamite bomb was thrown at the residence of the governor-general of St. Petersburg today. The house was practically demolished, but the governor escaped, being absent at the time of the explosion.

British Ambassador Harding, following official protest of the Russian government, has dispatched Major Napier, British military attaché, to Warsaw to make a thorough investigation of the attack on the British consul by Cossacks.

The strike is apparently ended. Most of the factories in this city started up today. Several large establishments are not fully opened, owing to the formality of registering thousands of employees.

A minor state of siege was today declared at Warsaw, where the situation is most serious. Fighting and pillage are in progress there in spite of the presence of troops.

The situation throughout Poland is threatening, especially at Warsaw and Lodz. Strikers are extending in Odessa and other manufacturing cities of southern Russia.

At Warsaw a group of Cossacks ran down the British vice-consul, Mucoufalin, Saturday night. Two Germans rushed at him and inflicted severe cuts across his face with their swords.

KUROPATKIN'S ARMY MEETS A REPULSE

Main Force Retiring Northwest Leaving Japanese Victors On Battlefield.

CASUALTIES ARE HEAVY TO CONTENTING FORCES

Japanese Have Three Thousand and Russians Ten Thousand Killed and Wounded.

(Journal Special Service.) London, Jan. 29.—Tokyo dispatches state that Kuropatkin's main force, which attacked Chen Chieh-pau and Lin-tiao last week, has retired to the northwest, after a complete repulse.

The casualties from the fighting at Chen Chieh-pau and Hekhalan, south of Mukden, last week, were: Japanese, 3,000 killed and wounded; Russians, 10,000 killed and wounded.

A St. Petersburg dispatch states that General Gripenberg reports that the Russians have occupied San Tai Taa and that Generala Mitschenko and Krodovitch are wounded.

The offensive Russian movement against the Japanese has ended in the Slavs being routed, the Japanese forces having repulsed the attacks and conquered all along the line.

The Russian advance has ended with a retreat to the right bank of the Tzun. The fighting was inaugurated by artillery firing Wednesday, followed by minor attacks, which on Friday and Saturday merged into a general battle all along the Japanese left, extending into the right and center.
