Governor Sends Message to Legislature Concerning Peniten- TRADING STAMP tiary Accusations.

-(From a Journal Staff Correspondent.) Salem, Or., Jan. 20.—Goyernor Chamberiain addressed a message this after-noon to the legislature relative to the charges of mismanagement in the penitentiary. After reciting the necessity of refurnishing the quarters of Superin-tendent James and Warden Curtiss when they took charge of the penitentlary, the governor states that:

they took charge of the penitentiary, the governor states that:

In case of the state insane asylum, the code provides that the superintendent and first and second assistant physicians shall be furnished a room, household furniture, provisions, fuel and light at the asylum, and requires that the superintendent shall reside at the asylum. There is no express provision of the law which allows any of these officers to have their families reside with them at the asylum or to support them from the commissary of the state, and no statute which authorizes the third and fourth assistant physicians to either reside at the asylum or have their families reside there, or that authorizes the their support from the commissary of the state; yet in the government of this institution the board of trustees has deemed it best to require all of these officers to reside at the asylum with their families and be supported at the expense of the state.

"Further than that, these officers and their families and the employes are per-

"Further than that, these officers and their families and the employes are permitted to have three waitresses to wait on the table and one assistant hook, all paid by the state, though there is no express statute for this.

"The same rule prevails in reference to the superintendents of the deaf mute school, blind school and reform school and their families because the trustees of each of these institutions deemed it for the best interest of the state.

"No express statute requires the em-
