Liverpool. Jan. 31.—Of the spple crop of the United States for 1904, the largest for eight years, 6,254,788 bushels were exported, the bulk coming to England. Canada also had a large crop. The total exports to Britain from both these countries during the year just closed were 3,894,309 packages, consisting of barrels and boxes containing 10,904,977 bushels of fruit. In this number were included 388,975 boxes of Callfornia apples. The bulk of these fruits were unshipped in Liverpool. London and Glasgow. The finest apples amrketed in England from the United States came, not from the Pajora valley, as previously, but from Oregon.

Seek to Rush Guard Myers, Who Forces Them to Obey Orders.

**BIG STRIKE THREATENS EXPOSITION BUILDERS** 

Much of Trouble Grows Out of Rules Regarding Badges and Entrances.

All the employes of the Burrell Construction company at the Lewis and Clark fair grounds are on strike and work is stopped on the Forestry building, Mining hall and Machinery palace, three of the most important structures. The men ask for all the concessions that the employes of the government building won last Saturday, including a uniform wage of \$3.50 a day for carpenters and a substantial advance in the earnings of laborers, skilled and unskilled. They say they are determined to carry the strike to the bitter end, and are awaiting on the grounds the decision of the contractor.

workmen and Guard Ben Myers, who held a crowd of 60 laborers at bay with his revolver.

The new rule of the admissions department went into effect today. It provides that every man employed on the grounds must wear a badge and earsy a pass. Upon receiving the budge they are required to deposit \$1\$ with the company, the dollar to be returned when the badge is given up. This arrangement did not satisfy the men, nor was it to their liking to be compelled to use the main entrance instead of the gaps that occur at frequent intervals in the board inclosure of the grounds. There were mutterings among the dissatisfied last evening, some declaring openly that they would enter the grounds as usual, no matter what method might be prescribed.

This morning a crowd of between 60 and 75 assembled at the carriage gate, two blocks aboye the main entrance. Guard Myers/was stationed there and denied them admission.

"Let's force the gate," cried a voice, and the crowd swept up to the guard. One of them swore at him, and Myers knocked him in the mud. He then

He then backed off a few paces, drew his weapon and faced the angry men, advising them to go to the main entrance. They did so, Meanwhile similar trouble was taking place on the peninsula. A large body of workmen encountered a guard there and defied him, all waiking in over his protest and pushing him to one side. It might not have been such an easy matter, but this guard had not been sworn in at the time and could not therefore use a stronger weapon than argument.

Chief Lang expects trouble again in the morning, but will be prepared for it. He attended the front gate himself, and a large majority of the workmen who appeared secured their badges.

SMEARS DOG WITH OIL AND SETS IT AFIRE

Smearing a small black and tan dog with oil and setting fire to the animal was considered a prank by some person hear the corner of Sixth and Burnside streets at noon. The dog was badly burned and nearly caused a big fire iff the neighborhood of Sixth and Pine streets. All aflame, he ran under a wooden building for shelter and safety. Seeing and hearing the burning dog, a large crowd gathered around the building where the animal sought shelter. When the dog was hauled from under the building its back, tall and hind legs were nearly broiled, and it was moaning piteously. Patrolman Rowley stated that he was near the corner when the dog ran down Sixth street.

"A young fellow was standing near me," said Rowley. "I asked him who set the dog on fire and he told fine that he had been holding the animal near the forge fire in Boyd & Hogan's blacksmith shop and that he had accidentally set fire to the animal. Then I went around and helped get the dog from under the bouse. I saw that it had been smeared with oil and set on fire, It was sickening."

The policeman will make an effort to arrest the person who set fire to the dog.


