

TWO CAUGHT IN BANK BREAKERS' RODEO

James Reynolds and Eli Dunne are prisoners in the county jail, suspected of complicity with two other men, Kingsley and Dorland, in the Lebanon bank robbery. The four men have been under espionage during the last six weeks, and it is believed they have been guilty of numerous burglaries and robberies in Portland and vicinity. Some reasons exist for suspecting them of having held up the O. R. & N. train a few weeks ago in the city limits of Portland. Reynolds and Dunne were captured Saturday night by Deputies of Sheriff Word. Kingsley left town on Friday night with his wife and went to Seattle, where he eluded capture, though Sheriff Word followed him there. Dorland's whereabouts are not known.

Battered gold pieces were found in the possession of the two men, and powder burns on the hands of Reynolds are regarded as evidence that they are of the gang that robbed the Lebanon bank.

Deputy Sheriff John Gruesz was the first official to gain knowledge that pointed toward Reynolds, Dorland, Kingsley and Dunne as members of a gang of professional burglars. He received information six weeks ago, which, taken in connection with facts subsequently obtained, confirmed the impression.

Five Burglary Outlets. Some time ago, a catch owned by one of the men was found, containing four pistols and several burglar's gimmicks and other tools. It was noticed that the members of the gang suddenly disappeared and that immediately thereafter some bank robbery or safe cracking would be reported.

So skillful were the men that it was impossible to secure testimony warranting their arrest. For a year past they had made the Schultz saloon and cafe at Second and Clay streets their rendezvous. They had plenty of money, yet did no work, and were careful never to discuss their antecedents.

A few days before the Lebanon bank was robbed the gang again disappeared. When news came of the robbery they were suspected and their return was watched for. An acquaintance of the men, Milholland by name, saw Kingsley and Dorland on the streets of Albany, on the Tuesday when the bank of Lebanon was robbed. He returned

and reported to the sheriff. Reynolds came to Portland on Wednesday, the day after the robbery; Dunne and Dorland returned on Thursday afternoon, and Kingsley on Thursday night. Deputy Sheriff Gruesz, watched them, and their movements confirmed the belief that they were the men wanted. Preparations were made to arrest them.

Roundup of Outlaws. Five search warrants were procured, and, on Saturday night, Sheriff Word and his deputies assembled to make the capture. It was necessary to watch five houses, and deputies were detailed to each house.

At 6:07 Second street Dunne was taken in a five-room cottage by Deputies Mcintosh and Coffey, Deputies Gruesz, Hollingsworth and Grafton guarding the doors.

Reynolds was taken by Deputy Downey in the Schultz saloon at Second and Clay streets. Downey entered the place, ordered a glass of beer, and quickly drew his pistol and covered Reynolds.

Reynolds gave his money to Mr. Schultz, as he was arrested, and this money was at once taken by the sheriff. It was badly battered, and is regarded as good evidence against him. About \$400 in cash and a certificate of deposit for \$500 from the First National bank of Portland were found in Reynolds' possession. At the bank today, Reynolds was identified as the man who deposited the money last Thursday, just before the bank closed.

Kingsley and his wife apparently have made their escape. A telegram to the Journal from Seattle today states that no hope is entertained of finding him. He is apparently a man of education and had said he was from England. His room was at the New Grant, corner of Second and Grant streets. Dorland's place of residence is not known.

Senator Mitchell Explains Letter Tanner Gave Out.

WILL ANSWER OTHER QUESTIONS AT TRIAL

Denies That He Hoped to Influence Tanner's Testimony Before Grand Jury.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, Feb. 14.—Senator Mitchell said today in reference to the letter alleged by the Associated Press and published in the papers here to have been sent by him to his law partner, Judge A. H. Tanner, by the hands of his secretary, H. C. Robertson:

"Yes, I sent the letter as published, and for this reason, as I think, in part at least, appears on its face. After I had been indicted, Judge Tanner had been retained by me at the leading attorney for my defense, and he had consented to act as such, as his letters in my possession would clearly show. Senator Fulton had also consented to my case, and his associate in my defense. I was extremely anxious that Tanner should come here for a consultation with Senator Fulton and myself in regard to my defense, and the question of my letter it was, as will appear from the letter itself, to induce him to come and bring with him all of our firm books, in order that we might be fully advised as to precisely what entries had been made, by whom made."

"I supposed I was writing a confidential letter to my retained attorney, urging an early consultation with me, his client, and with his associate attorney, Senator Fulton, and for reasons satisfactory to me when I wrote the letter, and I desired to avoid publicity in regard to my case. From the time that the letter came, hence my statement that it was confidential, and was treated as entirely confidential."

"Any other questions that may be desired of me in reference to this letter or any other matter connected with my case, I will be ready to promptly answer when my trial is called."

"The suggestion in the press dispatch that I desired to talk with Tanner in regard to his testimony before the grand jury is preposterous, as it has been publicly known for some time that the grand jury will adjourn long before Tanner could reach this city."

LURED BY PHONE AND SHOT DEAD IN HALL

Legislature Rebutted for Extravagance—Bill Passed to Cut Sleeper Fares in Oregon.

Salem, Feb. 14.—Three savage slashes at the general appropriation bill were made by Smith of Josephine, and each time he leaped off \$5,000. Three members who had been voting in favor of the bill were absent.

Of all the measures before the present legislature, none has been the occasion of more persistent lobbying than the bill to report the state of the session members have been lobbying with importunities to give it their support. 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PROTECTION OF YOUNG GIRLS

Nottingham's Side Entrance Measure Resurrected and Passes the Senate.

MALARKEY DECLARES BILL AN ABSURDITY

Had Been Reported Unfavorably—House to Consider in Near Future.

Salem, Feb. 14.—Killed once in the senate, Nottingham's bill prohibiting side entrances to saloons was resurrected by Pierce and last night passed the senate by a vote of 17 to 13. Malarkey's bill making it a felony for a man to take a woman under 21 years of age into a saloon or to give or sell her whisky unless she is accompanied by her husband or parents was passed by unanimous vote of the senate.

The side entrance bill was reported unfavorably by the judiciary committee. Nottingham opened the debate by telling of the evils surrounding young women and declaring that his proposed measure was intended for their protection.

Malarkey declared the bill an "absurdity."

"The measure is unreasonable and unjust," he asserted, "and does not in any way remedy the evil at which it is aimed. I sympathize with the senator from Multnomah in his desire to suppress the evil, but the bill will not accomplish that end. The one which you have passed tonight," This refers to his own measure. "The mistake made by legislatures, and especially by Oregon legislatures, is in passing laws which are not based on facts, but on mere sentimentalities."

Admitting his belief that the bill would pass, Malarkey attacked the practice of trading votes, which he said obtains in the legislature. He asserted that side entrances were one of Nottingham's hobbies and that, in common with a number of other bills trading had been done. Others, he thought, would vote for the bill, merely to please Nottingham or to avoid injuring his feelings. The merit or worth of a measure, he added, seemed to cut a small figure in the minds of the legislators. He said he was the father of boys and girls and he wanted them protected. In fact, he declared with emphasis, the measure was designed to protect boys and girls.

The bill will be considered by the house today or tomorrow.
