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PEABODY IS SEATED AND ADAMS OUSTED

Agrees in Advance to Retire in Favor of Lieutenant Governor Jesse F. McDonald.

MAY REPUDIATE PROMISE TO RETAIN HIS OFFICE

Question as to Whether Resignation Written Before Appointment is Legal.

Denver, March 17.—By promises made that he would retire after having been governor for 24 hours, James H. Peabody was yesterday seated as governor of Colorado by a vote of 55 to 41 in the general assembly.

Peabody's resignation was placed in the hands of W. S. Boynton to be filed by him with the secretary of state. It was written before Peabody was seated, and it is a question whether the promises will be fulfilled and Lieutenant Governor Jesse F. McDonald seated or whether the whole deal was a political trick to seat Peabody.

The resignation may be withheld and not presented at all. Even should it be presented there is a question as to its legality. Lawyers hold that Peabody could not resign from an office which he did not possess at the time the resignation was written.

Peabody's resignation was placed in the hands of W. S. Boynton to be filed by him with the secretary of state today. The bargain whereby Peabody was seated, was effected by pledges given by four corporations, who have been advancing Peabody's claims.

Governor Adams surrendered his office to Peabody shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday. He refused to make a contest by force, although urged to do so by numerous telegrams.

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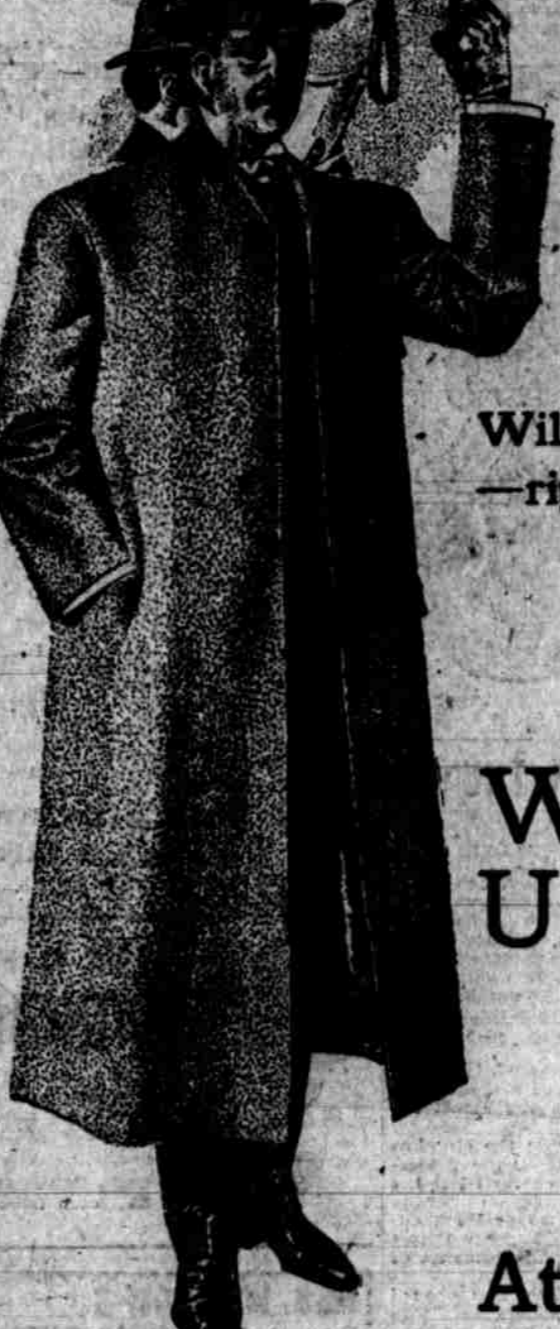
