

BENTON EXPECTS BIG PRUNE CROP

Trees Will Soon Be in Full Bloom Which is Unusual Condition of Affairs.

EASTERN IMMIGRANTS SEEKING LOCATIONS

County Court Will Have Many Civil Cases—Rush to Pay Taxes.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Corvallis, Or., March 18.—The Italian prune trees, which usually do not bloom until the middle of April, are expected to be in full bloom in another week. This condition is unusual, and is due to the remarkably warm, fine weather that has prevailed for the greater part of the past month or more. Five years ago the big Benton county prune orchard was full of blossoms in March. This year there was a failure of the crop at the big orchard, which gives rise to the belief that there will be a big crop this year. Spraying for San Jose scale has been done by the managers of the Benton orchard.

GENERAL HAWLEY IS DEAD AT WASHINGTON

Connecticut Soldier, Editor and Statesman, Passes Away From Old Age.

(Journal Special Service.) Washington, March 18.—Gen. Joseph R. Hawley, for the past 24 years United States senator from Connecticut, died yesterday, aged 73. Death came peacefully after a stupor lasting several days. General Hawley was born at Stewartville, N. C., October 21, 1832. He graduated from Hamilton college in 1857 and began the practice of law at Hartford, afterward becoming editor of the Evening Press. He enlisted in the union army, and afterward raised the Second Connecticut regiment, and was mustered out as brevet major-general at the close of the war.

PEABODY OUT, M'DONALD GOVERNOR OF COLORADO

(Journal Special Service.) Denver, March 18.—Governor Peabody laid yesterday resigned the gubernatorial chair, permitting Lieutenant-Governor Jesse F. McDonald to become governor. The latter was immediately sworn in just 24 hours after Governor Alva Adams was ousted by the legislature. Governor Adams states that he is going back to his home in Pueblo. He characterizes the legislative proceedings as an outrage, and states that he can endure it if the people can, and that he simply submits to the outrage that could not be peaceably prevented. Governor McDonald, in an interview today, said: "I was elected lieutenant-governor on a platform that called for the maintenance of law and order, and I will endeavor to the best of my ability to carry out this and every other pledge given to my party. It will be my chief aim to give an economical business administration. I shall strive to promote peace, law and order within the boundaries of the state."

CURFEW ORDINANCE FOR FOREST GROVE YOUTH

Forest Grove, Or., March 18.—At the last meeting of the city council a curfew ordinance was passed forbidding boys and girls under 15 years of age from being on the streets later than 9 o'clock in the winter and 8 in summer, unless accompanied by their parents. The council has also ordered a liquor license granted to E. Watson.

YOUNG PATRICIDE IS PREPARING FOR TRIAL

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., March 18.—Assistant Attorney-General A. J. Falkner of Olympia is to prosecute Attorney Buxton in the prosecution of Tom Brown for murder at the April term of the superior court. Brown is the 17-year-old boy who killed his father at Christmas time.

ATTEMPTED JAIL RELEASE FRUSTRATED BY POLICE

Chicago, March 18.—While making what the police allege was an attempt to liberate Frank Gagen, in the county jail, accused of the murder of Detective James O'Keefe, Frank Ludwig and Frank Glenn were captured by the jail guards early this morning. The men were discovered climbing a wall attached to the jail building. The guards say that two accomplices escaped with a package which it is believed contained dynamite. It is thought the intention was to blow up part of the building and effect Gagen's release.

CHEHALIS PREPARING EXPOSITION EXHIBIT

Chehalis, Wash., March 18.—A well attended meeting was held at the Citizens clubroom last night and a liberal subscription started with which to make an exhibit of the resources of Chehalis and Lewis county at the Lewis and Clark fair. The city will be actively canvassed today and tomorrow, and it is believed that there will be no trouble to secure all the money necessary to make a most creditable exhibition.

GROVER CLEVELAND IS SIXTY-EIGHT TODAY

FRENCH LOUISE'S BIRTHDAY

London, March 18.—Today being the 57th birthday of Princess Louise (Duchess of Argyll), the bells of St. George's chapel, Windsor castle and St. John's church pealed merrily in honor of the event. The customary royal salute was fired in the Longwalk. Princess Louise was born at Buckingham palace on March 13, 1848.

SECRETARY HAY IS DANGEROUSLY ILL

Collapses as He Boards Celtic for a European Trip—Illness Hitherto Kept Secret.

(Journal Special Service.) New York, March 18.—Secretary of State Hay, while boarding the steamship Celtic to sail for Europe today, was seized with a fit of weakness and collapsed. Henry Adams, a friend, assisted him to a pile of freight from which place he was taken by wheel chair on board the steamer. Mrs. Hay was with her husband. Members of the party said nothing serious was the matter and that the secretary was simply overcome by excitement and fatigue. Mrs. Hay admitted that her husband was very sick. She said: "No one in Washington except his family and probably the cabinet realized how ill Mr. Hay has been." As she passed Sandy Hook the Celtic signalled: "Hay much better." When Clarence Hay saw a group of newspaper men on the pier he was heard to remark to his father: "Well, it cannot be helped. They know now." This is not the first time Mr. Hay has collapsed. Since a severe attack of grip last winter he has been very weak.

CASTRO STRIKES AT AMERICAN CONCERN

Venezuelan Court Finds Asphalt Trust Aided Matos' Revolution.

(Journal Special Service.) Williamstad, Caracas, March 18.—Advices from Caracas, Venezuela, state that the superior court has decided on appeal, March 15, that the American Asphalt company aided the Matos revolution. The federal court will fix damages. Final judgment may not be rendered for several months. This case is separate from the action of the government to rescind the company's concession. The action of France in inviting the co-operation of America in settlement of the Venezuelan situation is regarded as a preliminary step toward the relief of the situation in Caracas, which has for several years exasperated both Europe and America. The action of Castro against the French Cable company, followed by his summary action against the Asphalt company, is regarded as high-handed, and will probably provoke an ultimatum from both governments, followed by naval demonstrations.

HEROIC TRAMP RISKS HIS LIFE IN VAIN

(Journal Special Service.) Fresno, Cal., March 18.—A heroic attempt to save a woman's life was made this morning by G. W. Reed, who jumped into the city in search of work and who spent the night beneath the ruds shelter of trees. Just at dawn Reed was awakened by a noise coming from a near-by house. He rushed to it at once and met at the door an excited man, who cried: "For God's sake, help! There's a woman in there burning to death!" Putting his coat over his head, Reed rushed into the blazing room, stumbling over the body of a woman on the floor. He picked her up and carried her out, however, till he himself was badly burned.

FAIRBANKS HONORED BY THE OHIO SOCIETY

TREASURE IS FOUND IN HEART OF AN OAK

Jewelry, Silver Service, Deeds and Papers Placed in Tree Hundred Years Ago.

(Journal Special Service.) New York, March 18.—A deed transferring 12 acres of land within the bounds of New York city, a mortgage and a will, both dated December 11, 1789, other business papers, together with a silver service, knives, forks, with a silver ring, a pair of diamond earrings and a pearl brooch, all encased in a stout tin box, were found in the heart of an oak tree today by one of a gang of woodsmen who were cutting timber south of Lincoln Park, N. Y. Carl Glickerson was the finder and he placed the treasure in the hands of a lawyer to hold for him. In case a legal claimant turns up he will surrender the papers, but believes the silver and jewelry are his by finder's right. The will is the last testament of Matthew Weatherby and by it transfers on the death of his son, Charles Andrew, \$12,000 in money and personal property and 12 acres in land on the island of Manhattan. The interior of the tree was perfectly dry with the exception of a slight coating of mold. The papers were perfectly preserved.

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LOGGERS INSTANTLY CRUSHED TO DEATH

Charles Lippie, While Endeavoring to Loosen Jam, is Caught by Heavy Logs.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., March 18.—Charles Lippie, an employe of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, on one of its log drives, was accidentally killed yesterday afternoon. The drive on which he was working is on the Mohawk river and is on the way to the Coburg mill. Owing to the low stage of the river a jam had formed, and at the time of his death Lippie was attempting to loosen the logs. Suddenly and without warning the logs gave way, and before the unfortunate man could get to a place of safety the logs were upon him, crushing his life out instantly. The body was brought to Eugene last evening and arrangements will be made today for the burial. Little is known here of Lippie, except that he came from eastern Oregon, and has been in the employ of the Booth-Kelly company only a short time.

Was Veteran of Rogue River Indian War—Law Partnership is Formed.

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THREE INJURED IN RUNAWAY ACCIDENT

Mother Throws Children Out of Buggy to Save Them and Then Jumps.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) La Grande, Or., March 18.—As the result of a runaway accident last night Mrs. Charles Smith, wife of a farmer living six miles from La Grande, and her two children were seriously injured. Mrs. Smith was driving home, when her horse became frightened by a train on the Edin branch and ran away. Seeing that she could not control the animal, which was madly dashing toward the oncoming train, Mrs. Smith threw her small son and daughter out of the buggy and then jumped herself. The boy, aged 10, is the worst injured of the trio, suffering a fractured skull and other serious injuries. His recovery is doubtful. The little girl, aged 7, seriously bruised but no bones are broken. Mrs. Smith's ankle was severely fractured and she sustained other bruises. The train crew saw the children lying in the road and the motorist stopped and picked them up, bringing them to La Grande, where medical attention was provided.

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
