CHRISTIANS OWE A DUTY TO EACH OTHER

Dr. Chapman Points Out Eloquent Responsibilities That Rest on Believers.

The unexpected has happened in Portland in so far as those people who are scornful of the religious revival are concerned. Those who went to one meeting expecting to hear a ranting, flogging evangelist, shouting warnings against fire and brimstone and trying to drive sinners to repentance by creating a hysterical atmosphere were disappointed, and went again.

Rev. Mr. Stelze Will Tell the Carpenter's Story to Workmen Tomorrow.

Dr. Walton Said World Heard the Stroke on Day of Pentecost.

Dr. Walton's subject at the Sunnyside Congregational was "A Call for Help." He began with the text, Acts, 1:31: "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."

"It matters not what the difficulty, what the trouble, or condition of the help," he said, "all that is needed for salvation is to call upon Him who is able to save.
