SURVEYING PARTIES COVERING THE COUNTRY

Ex-City Engineer to Answer C. M. Levey of Northern Pacific Takes Charge of Work About Lewiston.

Two hundred and seventeen subpoenas have been issued by District Attorney Manning summoning witnesses in the cases against William C. Elifott, J. M. Caywood, Henry Chandler, E. W. Riner and R. M. Riner, who have been indicted in connection with the Tanner creek sewer scandals. Many of the witnesses were seved with five subpoenas, commanding them to appear at the trials of all five defendants.

Among the witnesses are: H. R. Albee,

utmost secrecy is maintained as to their plans and purposes.

Mr. Levey, in his private car Minnewaska, arrived at Lewiston, accompanied by Assistant Chief Engineer Crosby, and they were met by John P. Vollmer, a Northern Pacific stockholder, and immediately driven to Clarkston, where they assumed supervision of the movements of a large party of surveyors encamped near that city. Asked to explain the purpose of his visit, Mr. Levey stated that the Northern Pacific company was merely relocating old lines of survey. Replying to a question as to why surveying parties were operating on government land and near Glarkston where no former lines had been run, he is quoted as reluctantly admitting that "we are having inese surveys made in order to prepare for the future, so that when word comes to us we will be prepared to do business."

He further admitted that agents of the Northern Pacific company are making contracts for right of way through the prairie country between Lewiston and Clearwater.

The presence of the Northern Pacific's official party and their force of sur-

The presence of the Northern Pacific's official party and their force of surveyors in the Lewiston country, with instruments pointing down the Snake river toward Pasco, is regarded as the most significant move made by either company in years in the Pacific northwest.

It is believed at Lewiston that this will shortly be followed by active construction work that will surpass the big battle of five years ago, when nearly 3,000 men were employed in the work between Lewiston and Riparia. Movements of the Northern Pacific engineers in every part of the field, it is said, have been marked by a certain definiteness that has created the impression that a plan of construction has been fully decided on and that long needed means of transportation are about to be granted.

The old Northern Pacific survey crosses the Snake river at a point almost due west from the company's roundhouse at Lewiston, and here a bridge is now being planned by Engineer Crosby. From Clarkston the line follows the south bank of the Snake river to a soint below Riparis, where it again crosses the river and continues to Pasco. The company is said to have a line surveyed down the north bank of the Columbia river from Pasco to Vancouver, and it is known that engineers for this company a few weeks ago compicted company a few weeks ago completed surveys across the peansula from a point opposite Vanceuver to St. Johns, and there across the Willamette river, connecting with their present Portland


