APPROVE PEOPLE BY APPOINTMENTS

Williams and Hunt Name Men With Bad Records on the Police Force.

HUNTER NOTORIOUS IN NORTH END VICES

To Add to Scandal, Patrolman Fones is Restored on Threats of Talking.

Scandal in the police department, following the appointment of 28 patrolmen by Mayor Williams and Chief Hunt is growing in magnitude. The cover was removed from the cauldron by publication in part of the record of Willie Hunter, one of the appointees...

That Mayor Williams and the police commissioners appreciate the serious nature of the charges against Hunter is shown by their failure to place him on a beat. Senator Sichel was in conference with Chief Hunt for some time yesterday. Hunter was told to report at police headquarters at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

It has developed that the officer to whom Hunter applied two years ago to see if some way could not be found to cause Sergeant Church to "lie down" and cease arresting an unfortunate workman...

Another appointment to the force, also said to have been made on the recommendation of Chief Hunt, which has led to caustic criticism, is that of Robert Phillips. This patrolman was on the force for some time, but resigned last February, declaring that he was "too small. It is alleged by certain patrolmen that Phillips has none too savory a reputation and has been the object of considerable street talk on account of the relations he bore to a woman...

To add to the scandal, the department is discussing the reinstatement of Patrolman L. C. Fones, suspended on March 10 by the venerable chief. Though Fones was reinstated Friday, he did not go on duty at 12:30 yesterday, his pay is to be allowed from April 1. This means practically that half the time he spent under suspension was in the nature of a vacation, with pay.

The largest gasoline automobile on the Pacific coast has just been completed by the Gill Gas Engine & Machine company of this city. This machine was shipped to its destination on April 5. This large automobile is to carry passengers between Shaniko and Bend, Or. It was designed and built for the Central Oregon Transportation company, who have built a special road from Cross Keys to Bend, Or. It will carry from 12 to 16 passengers at a load and has been tested by the makers up to a speed of 26 miles per hour. It will climb any kind of grade found on the ordinary country roads. The wheels of this machine are shod with heavy

solid rubber tires. These rubber tires, together with the platform suspension springs, absorb the shocks due to the irregularity in the road, and as the machine is upholstered with fine leather cushions it makes it a very comfortable riding conveyance. It also has a storm top, which when closed makes the interior warm and dry and far more comfortable than the most modern stage coaches. In one of the photographs it shows the curtains rolled up showing the seats and in the other one the curtains is shown down and how the machine can be turned into an inclosed auto. The power for driving this vehicle is furnished by a 40-horsepower 4-cylinder gasoline engine, which is placed under the hood on the front of the machine. Immediately in front of the engine is a radiator which cools the water used around the cylinders of the engine. This radiator has over 300 small tubes through which the water passes, around

state, and numbering each vehicle. The number of each certificate, preceded by the letter "Or," shall be displayed on the back of such automobile or motor cycle, in light-colored arabic numerals at least 1/2 inches high on a dark background. Vehicles of automobiles from other states, touring Oregon, shall bear in similar manner the initials of the state from which they come, and shall have complied with the automobile laws of that state.

"Speed is limited by section 10, the legal rate being at 3 miles an hour within the thickly settled or business portion of any city or village and in the country when within 100 yards of any vehicle drawn by horses; at 24 miles an hour outside of thickly settled or business portions of cities or villages on public roads, highways or parkways, and at 4 miles an hour at street intersections within the limits of any city or village. Section 11 specifies a general speed limitation whereby automobiles on any highway, street or parkway shall drive the same at any speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard for the traffic and use of the way by others. Racing on any of the said ways is forbidden.

"The manner of prosecution is set out in section 12 to be that any proper officer who shall arrest the owner or driver of an automobile, motor vehicle or motorcycle for an infraction of any part of the act shall take the motorist immediately before a magistrate who shall hear the case at once, or upon request of the defendant and upon the
