While Mothers Hear the Gospel Children Are Cared for by Association.

Over a Hundred Native Sons and Daughters Have Pleasant Experience Yesterday.

One hundred and fifteen babies were cared for yesterday in the improvised nurseries at the Marquam building and the White Temple during the meetings for women only. These nurseries have been features of the revivals.

The creche in the Marquam building yesterday was a well organized affair, under the direction of the Home Training association. Mrs. Samuel A. Connell, president. At the foot of the elevator in the entrance to the Marquam theatre members of the association took charge of the babies, and they were taken to the Knights of Pythias hall, on the eighth floor. The Home Training association has carried on this work through the entire series of revivals, and has also provided mothers when the meetings were for women only.

RIGHTEOUS MAN WANTED FOR MAYOR

Dr. Chapman Urges Gathering at Armory to Register in Interest of Morality.

MOST NOTABLE MEETING OF REVIVAL CAMPAIGN

Hundreds of Men Ask Dr. Biederwolf to Pray for Their Immediate Conversion.

This is the closing day of the evangelistic revival. Dr. Chapman is addressing a great throng at the armory this afternoon, and there will be farewell services in all of the districts tonight.

Yesterday was notable in the remarkable campaign. The great event was the men's meeting at the armory, where upward of 4,000 heard Dr. Biederwolf on "God's Gentleman." It was one of the most impressive sermons of the series and, as is characteristic of Dr. Biederwolf's preaching, contained many stories of pathos which visibly affected his hearers. The response to the evangelist's appeal for reformation was great. Probably 200 in the audience lifted their hands for prayer and a good percentage of them took part in the after-meeting; a score or more of conversions were made publicly.

Before the sermon, Dr. Chapman spoke a few words on political conditions. He urged every man present to register and vote in the interest of morality. When he asked "Who will be the next mayor of Portland?" men in the house shouted the names of their favorite candidates, and after order had been restored Dr. Chapman expressed his belief that "a man of righteousness" would hold that office.

The music at the meeting included solos by Fred Butler and Harry Maxwell and a selection by the male quartet.

While this meeting was in progress Dr. Ostrom was addressing a mammoth gathering of women at the Marquam Grand. When that house was filled an overflow meeting was held at the White Temple, where Evangelist Thomas Needham spoke. These were among the most interesting services of the campaign.

At the request of the proprietor of Fritz's theatre, in the north end, Evangelist Snyder visited the notorious resort last night and preached from the stage on "Sinning-Will Oats." It cost each man 10 cents to hear the gospel preached there, but the crowd filled the theatre and listened attentively to a very impressive appeal for the better life.

At the Men's Resort, earlier in the evening, Mr. Snyder spoke to a large crowd and made 18 conversions at the conclusion of the meeting.

YOU'VE GOT TO GO TO HEAVEN HEART FIRST

A great crowd at Calvary Baptist church last night listened to Evangelist H. W. Stough on "What Must I Do to be Saved." The interesting narrative of Paul and Silas was the basis of Dr. Stough's address.

"The first step toward heaven is the wanting to be saved; an honest desire to be right with God," said the preacher. "The second step is the willingness to let God save you. The great fight is with your will. We can pray for you, can plead with you and can give you our earnest sympathy; but it is in you, yourself, who must take the decisive step. Every man who goes to heaven, goes not head first, but heart first."

"You must believe that Jesus Christ died for you. Does that sound threadbare? How many people fail to grasp its significance?"

"Do you believe on the Lord Jesus Christ you must believe that he is able to save. To whom would you rather trust your spiritual welfare of all the leaders of the age? To Confucius? Look at Chinatown today, with all its misery and degradation. To Buddha? Look at the heathen hordes of India, where Buddhism has reigned supreme. No teacher of all the cults and ethical systems can compare with this Jesus, the Christ. None of them professed as much as Jesus, who went down to death and then returned to comfort his followers."

POOR CHRISTIANS BEAT GOOD MORALISTS

The Grace M. E. church was crowded last night with the overflow from the Chapman meeting. Mr. Butler rendered one of his most effective sermons. Dr. Clarence True Wilson, the pastor, delivered an earnest sermon on the first Psalm, taking for his text, "The ungodly are not so." He said there were marked differences between the righteous and the wicked. He contrasted the poor specimens of a Christian with the best moralist, and showed that the advantages are with the man who tries and fails, rather than with the one who ignores God.

The Grace church will begin a series of special meetings on Tuesday evening immediately following the Chapman meetings, in order to still further help those who had begun the Christian life and to give those who have not yet decided another chance.

CONVERTS TELL HOW IT FEELS TO BE SAVED

The largest crowd ever seen at a street meeting in Portland gathered last evening at the corner of Third and Alder streets. Mr. McComb did not preach as he usually does, but called on several new converts to tell of their past lives and how they had, since the meetings commenced, decided for Christianity. The meetings were greatly assisted by Charles Hart, who sang two selections, and E. Lee Paget, who also sang.

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HELL IS WHERE YOU MAKE IT, SAYS PASTOR

W. F. Small Says Doctrine of Literal Place of Eternal Torture is Hideous.

"Heaven or hell is right where you sit; wherever you may be, and wherever you may make it," said Rev. W. F. Small, pastor of the First Universalist church, in commenting last night on the revival services held in this city the past three weeks. "I thought that hell had been relegated to the background," continued he, "but when I attended these meetings I was depressed to hear the word used as of old. I heard the literalistic part of the Bible held up without discrimination. They spoke of a black, impenetrable hell where our friends and loved ones must go and where the majority of the human race must go."

"There is no excuse for preaching such a hideous doctrine from a Christian pulpit in this enlightened day and age."

I know there were men and women on the platform where this doctrine was preached who did not believe it, nor did the men who preached this doctrine believe it. "One evangelist said: 'I try to keep more hell out of men's than men out of hell.' That is true doctrine. I do not believe that these evangelists who preach the obsolete doctrine of the literal hell believe that they are saying themselves. It may help a few, but it will turn away many more whose intelligence cannot accept the doctrine as compatible with the attributes of a loving God, the father of us all. "This evangelistic movement is somewhat different from the usual revival, in that it lacks the element of excitement, emotion and sensational hysteresis, sometimes attend such meetings, although there has been manifested intense feelings in the meetings I have attended."
