Tom Williams, Representative of the Old School of Gaming Men, Is Dead.

KNOWN WHEREVER A CHIP RATTLED IN NORTHWEST

Had Respect of All, and Money and Time Were Always at Friends' Command.

When Tom Williams dled yesterday there passed away an interesting repre-sentative of the old school of gamblers

sentative of the old school of gamblers in the west. Along the coast and throughout the northwest he bore a reputation for honesty and uprightness that was untained during an active career of 30 years.

In every city and hamlet in the northwest where a fare bank has run and chance has ruled. Williams was known and respected. His friends were numbered not only among the fortune-followers, but among business men as well, and in circles outside his own he bere the name of "Honest Tom."

Williams was a salior by trade, a fare dealer by occupation, and a gambler by nature. From a long line of ancestry he is said to have inherited a spirit of restless adventure that the roving of the

sea did not satisfy and that many years ago led him to cast his lot with the vast army that seeks fortune by the turn of a wheel, the flip of a card, or any other chance.

Williams' most prominent characteristic was his blind allegiance to his friends, his constant willingness to ald a comrade in misfortune. It was his unswerving fidelity to a friend who proved unworthy that cost him a fortune and caused whatever bitterness was shown in his later life.

Most of his friends deserted him, he was alone, and even hope seemed gone. Henry E. Mc-Ginn was district attorney at the time, and the gambler's fate seemed certain. It was then that Tom Williams, a friend of "Sandy" Olds, "came to the front." In his own little circle he set about working up sympathy in hehalf of the condemned men. The sympathy spread, and at last reached something like hopeful proportions. Williams contributed generously of his money to secure an appeal.

Failing to get the necessary sum in

Falling to get the necessary sum in Portland he went through several states in the northwest soliciting from gam-blers the sum necessary to secure an blers the sum necessary to secure an appeal. He was at last successful and the higher court granted a rehearing of the case. Again Olds was convicted and sentenced to be hanged and for a second time a new trial was granted. Realising that public sentiment in Multnomsh county, would not benefit his friend. Williams obtained a change of venue and the third trial was held in Washington county. Olds was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to one year's imprisonment. Efforts in his behalf ceased after such a decided victory.

A short time after his release from A short time after his release from the state pentientiary Olds returned to Portland. His former prestige among the gambling element was gone, but Williams was still his friend. Olds began to play, and at his first sitting in Williams' place won \$500. He immediately took the money, went into rival houses and squandered it in riotous

arousals.
Similar and repeated acts finally aused Williams to "remove him from caused Williams to "remove him from his list," as gamblers say. Olds' deciline from a prosperous and influential gambler into a common "bunko" man was rapid. He is now an outcast and has been driven by the police from every city in the west.

Williams was 53 years of age, and is survived by a widow and two children. He was a member of the Grays

From the position of a door-keeper he rose to that of dealer, and soon became interested in the ownership and management of the place. Shortly after he acquired an interest in the house, a bitter war broke out between factions in gambling interests. It was a war to the death and indeed death actually resulted, and it was to save his friend, the mure as worthless subject.
