### EASTERN LINES SHARE HANDS WITH FAIR

Telegrams From Railroad Men Tell of the Reduction in Rates to Portland.

Telegrams from F. B. Eustis, passenger traffic manager of the Burlington; Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific; W. A. Cleland, general passenger agent of the same road; F. L. Whitney, passenger traffic manager of the Great Northern; Charles B. Fee, passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific; E. O. McCormick, assistant traffic manager of the Harriman lines, and George H. Daniels, general passenger agent New York Central railroads, have been received by A. L. Craig, the Portland Commercial club and the chamber of commerce announcing action by the Central Passenger Traffic association confirming the action by the Trunk Lines association in granting a one-fare round trip rate, plus \$1, for the entire period of the Lewis and Clark fair, and for all national conventions held in Portland during that time.

### NO BICYCLE TAX COLLECTED THIS YEAR

But to Make Up for This There Will Be No Improvements on the Bike Paths.

No bicycle tax has been collected this year; hence there will be no work on the bicycle paths provided for by law. The law has been inoperative since the decision of Judge George was rendered last year, which declared that deputy sheriffs could not lawfully seize bicycles and their riders to collect the tax.

Prominent physicians and health authorities from all sections of the country will attend the meeting, and the local medical fraternity is making arrangements to receive and entertain them in a becoming manner.
