

EVANGELIST SAYS HE HAS MET GOD

Evan Roberts the Welch Revivalist Has Had Talks With the Almighty.

WONDERFUL COMMUNION LASTED FOR FOUR HOURS

As a Result of His Vision Roberts Has Effected a Moral Revolution.

New York, April 15.—The fact that Evan Roberts, the Welsh revivalist, has met God face to face and held repeated communion with him, it is Evan Roberts, the young collier who has evangelized Wales so completely as to effect a moral and religious revolution. So wonderful a man is Roberts and so marvelous are his works that William T. Stead, publicist, author, statesman and scholar, made a trip to South Wales to study him and the infection he has spread abroad. It was to Mr. Stead that Roberts told his amazing story. When the editor asked him how he began his long life, he said: "For a long time I was much troubled in my heart and my soul, by thinking over the failure of Christianity. Oh, it seemed such a failure—such a failure—and I prayed and prayed, but nothing seemed to give me relief. "But one night after I had been in great distress about this, I went to sleep and at 1 o'clock in the morning suddenly I waked out of my sleep and I found myself with unspoken words in my heart and in my soul, 'Always I enjoyed four hours of that wonderful communion with God. I cannot describe it. I felt it, and it seemed to change all my nature. I saw things in a different light. I saw things as if I were going to work in the land and not only this land, but all the world.' "And for the space of four hours I was privileged to speak face to face with him as man speaks face to face with a friend. At 1 o'clock I was again alone as I again returned to earth. "Were you not dreaming?" "No, I was wide awake. And it was not only that morning, but every morning for three or four months. Always I enjoyed four hours of that wonderful communion with God. I cannot describe it. I felt it, and it seemed to change all my nature. I saw things in a different light. I saw things as if I were going to work in the land and not only this land, but all the world."

MILLIONAIRE AUTOIST IS CLEVERLY CAUGHT

New York, April 15.—Marcus Daly, son of the late copper magnate of that name, was cleverly caught by Connecticut constables this afternoon while speeding a heavy French automobile from New Haven to New York with George F. FOREIGN NATIONS MAP AMERICAN COAST LIGHTS

Washington, April 15.—It has been discovered that foreign nations have taken the pains to get such accurate information as to the location of the seaports as to United States coast defenses that they have plotted them on maps, the lights being immensely valuable at night as range for sailing. The military and other experts immediately went right at work to make this foreign knowledge absolutely useless. It is proposed, and money has been appropriated for it, to place platforms for the lights, which can be raised or lowered. By a scheme known only to the experts the obscuring of the lights alternately will mystify the navigator of a ship approaching the coast or trying to sail by these lights. The chances will be 100 to 1 for a ship wreck if he trusts to the new wiggly status.

A GOOD CHARACTER FOR ROCKEFELLER

Preacher Who Met Him for a Week Says That He is a Pious Man.

READ BIBLE AND PRAYED EVERY DAY AFTER MEALS

Could Not Reconcile, However, His Private Life With His Business Methods.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal.) Litchfield, Conn., April 15.—The clearest insight into the character of John D. Rockefeller ever obtained by those not intimately associated with him, was given today by John Hutchins, pastor of the Congregational church of Litchfield. Mr. Hutchins spent a week in the spring of 1903, intimately with Mr. Rockefeller and his family, and basing his judgment upon that opportunity for learning much of character of the multi-millionaire, he declared Mr. Rockefeller to be a man of the most intensely religious convictions and a man sincerely endeavoring to accomplish as much as possible for the good of the world. This certificate of good character for Mr. Rockefeller, was given gratuitously by Mr. Hutchins. "In the early spring of 1903, Mr. Rockefeller and his family came to one of the smaller mountain resorts," said Hutchins today, "and I was brought, accidentally, into a week of close contact with him. "We took long walks together and I was soon asked to leave the private table and apartments of the proprietor and join Mr. Rockefeller's family as their guest. "I was sharing, for the time, the kindly intimacy of a Christian household and the man of the household, as I should be, the leader in this. Having the house, entirely to themselves, there was a freedom which ordinary hotel life would not have permitted. Each morning after the breakfast, there were family prayers with reading from the Bible. As a minister, with an experience in many churches, one comes to know something of this function. "Of the observation in this particular family I can say that none in any place ever impressed me more with its loving earnestness and simplicity. The entire atmosphere of the family life was the atmosphere of love. "Mr. Rockefeller went to the city for a day. On his return he told me that he found his son at the church watching a class of young men. Then he added, Mr. Hutchins, I would rather have my son filling such a part as that than to see him sitting king on a throne. "I realize the incongruity of the situation and lament it. I have heard a man and a minister of Mr. Rockefeller's own denomination tell things respecting upon Mr. Rockefeller's moral character, but claiming he had positive proofs of their truthfulness. But I have not believed and do not believe that Mr. Rockefeller is anything but a sincerely Christian man; which I found him to be during the week of unthought and accidental personal contact. "The question will arise how to reconcile the private Christian character with the large public dealings in the world of finance, and it is a curious case but the following to him in more than one of our conversations, and could give his answer if that were any object. They were not satisfactory to me, they were to him. But I make no attempt at reconciliation, either to stir up my own mind or the minds of others. I simply bear witness to the lasting impression of Christian character and sincerity which that intercourse made upon me."

TO TAKE ORE LANDS OF GREAT NORTHERN

New Corporation Formed to Develop Mines Owned by Hill System.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal.) Boston, April 15.—A new corporation is to be formed to take over the last holdings of ore lands owned by the Great Northern railway and develop them. This innovation in finance is intended as a conversion of the fixed assets into dividends for the stockholders. The Great Northern stockholders will receive as a bonus for giving up their equity in the lands new stock which will be worth \$100 per share to them. On this basis it will be worth \$29 a share to the holders of Northern Securities and about 15 per cent to Union Pacific stockholders. The Union Pacific will receive about \$22,900,000 of the Great Northern stock and will therefore receive the same amount of the new ore stock. The Northern Securities stockholders will receive about \$29 in Great Northern, and on the basis above outlined will receive the same amount in the new ore stock. The purchase of the lands will be made from the Great Northern direct by the new company, the exchange of rights being effected by giving the new stock to the holders of record at the time the deal is increased.

FOUR HIGHWAYMEN GET TEN YEARS APIECE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Seattle, April 15.—Edward Allen, William Feighe, J. Tibbur and Frank Henry, four highwaymen who held up and robbed fully six persons in various parts of Seattle the latter part of March, pleaded guilty to highway robbery in the superior court this morning and were sentenced by Judge Griffin to each serve 10 years at hard labor in the Walla Walla penitentiary. Feighe and Tibbur gave their ages as 20 years, while the other two declare they are 23 years old. The men made no remarks when sentence was imposed but took it as if it was a matter of course.

MARIE TEMPEST LANDS WITH ENTIRE COMPANY

TAR AND FEATHER MICHIGAN WOMAN

Fifteen Young Ladies and Four Men Compel Objectionable Female to Leave.

SCANDALOUS ACTIONS PROMPTLY PUNISHED

Compelled to Strip While Thick Coat of Tar is Applied With Feathers.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal.) Hudson, Mich., April 15.—Fifteen young women and four men, whose names the police may be unknown, tarred and feathered a woman on Monday night. Mrs. Post has been living in the Retan building alone. Well-known men have been frequenting the Retan block since Mrs. Post took up her residence there and gave rise to considerable scandal. Complaints made to the police were unheeded and some young married women advised Mrs. Post by letter that she would better leave the city. No attention was paid to this, except that a man supposed to be her husband suddenly appeared on the scene. Late on Monday night, after the streets were deserted, 15 women and four men, all said to be prominent in the city, appeared at the door of Mrs. Post's quarters and gained admission. They did not hesitate to make their errand known, and when the stranger tried to interfere the men of the party told him he would better get into another room and keep quiet. The women then ordered Mrs. Post to remove some of her garments. Despite her pleadings, they applied a thick coat of tar from buckets which they had brought along and then sprinkled an abundance of feathers upon it. Then they parted with a warning that if the rooms were not vacated within 45 hours worse treatment would be inflicted. Mrs. Post has disappeared.

WEDS A MILLIONAIRE BUT LOSES HER TRUNK

Chicago, April 15.—Mrs. Charles Dosche, wife of a California millionaire, departed for San Francisco on a wedding trip tonight leaving her trunk and personal belongings behind at the Francis Ward hospital, where she was nursing Lucy Anne Schulte until her hurried wedding Friday. There was disclosed another hospital romance, as Miss Schulte nursed Mrs. Dosche back from the grave in Mendocino last year. "We could get the trunk until she pays \$40 which she agreed to forfeit if she did not remain here two years," declared Mrs. Mary Ingelgard, president of the board of trustees of the hospital. "But that would take too long; what's the use?" Theresean Mrs. Dosche cut her hair and packed her trunk and left for the Pacific coast, where her husband has a big fruit ranch, and where boards of trustees will bother her no more.

PORTLANDER TESTS PROBATION LAW


