Captain T. E. Parker of the Holt Hill Has Sailed Many Miles.

GOT NINETY SHILLINGS FOR CARRYING WHEAT

Took First Gold From South Africa to England in the Sixties.

Captain T. E. Parker of the British ship Holt Hill is the oldest commander, at point of service, of a vessel in the world.

Next November he will have been a captain for 50 years. He is now 71 years young, and is livelier than many younger men. His first voyage was in 1854, when he sailed for the first time as a seaman. When 15 years old, Captain Parker said, his mind had been so filled with the sea that he decided to go to sea. He was then a cabin boy on the wooden ship William Francis, which carried a cargo of coal from Cardiff to Montevideo, returning to Falmouth loaded with the golden wheat. By making himself handy and by hours of hard study in the raking of the sea, young Parker quickly rose from the position of pot washer to that of first mate; he was but 18 when given the place of chief officer of the Eburn, in her day one of the crack English packets plying between Great Britain and this country. His first passage as chief officer was from Hull to Philadelphia with a general cargo.

A Young Captain.

Several weeks after his 21st birthday, Parker was made captain of the ship Tiger, and sailed with his charge from Hull to Rio de Janeiro with a general cargo. He was in the Davy Jones locker; that was while he was master of the Ellenbank, a full rigged ship that went insane off Cape Horn, and was abandoned by her crew July 4, 1858.

Picked Up Off the Cape.

As all the lifeboats had been washed away, we were forced to stay on board for three days, living on biscuits and water. When we were picked up by the Canadian bark Chinampa, I never heard of the hull from that day.

Captain Parker states that he carried the first South African gold to England. This was in the early '60s, when in command of the ship Actaea. At that time he was trading between Port Natal and London. The gold was in a small glass bottle and came from 200 miles inland. Three tons of rock were also put aboard the Actaea, assigned to a London assay office. When the report of the Actaea's cargo was made public, the great South African gold rush began.

Treadwell Amalgam Theft Revivifies Stories of Raids on Mine and Mill.

OREGON MANAGERS HAVE TO WATCH THEIR MINES

Famous Districts of the World Where the Wily Miner is Severely Examined.

The Treadwell management's success in entrapping an amalgamator who is accused of taking large quantities of bullion from the big Douglas Island mill, has revived stories of bullion and ore thefts. Oregon has never been seriously troubled in this respect. Only a few of her leading properties have opened rich ore in such quantity as to tempt workmen, and whatever thefts may have been perpetrated in mills have caused little interest.

Two years ago there was a general movement among operators in the Cracker Creek district of eastern Oregon, to arrest ore thieves. Many rich specimens were found to have been taken from the Columbia, North Pole and the Golconda. This was at a time when the North Pole was producing as rich rock as was ever taken from a mine. Some of the specimens sold to jewelers and other buyers seemed to be almost solid nuggets, with barely sufficient quartz to retain the name, "ore."

ing has been so bold that the margin of profit is swept away by the miner.

But a search system has prevailed in few western properties. In Oregon there is not a mine where the men going off shift are subjected to this indignity, and no effort is made to detect thefts in this manner. But there are few high-grade mines which do not employ detectives as spotters. These work with the men, sleep in the bunkhouse, and ingratiate themselves into the grace of the miners until they get a clew as to who is selling specimen rock. Cripple Creek was one of the most famed camps of the country for ore stealing sensations. The rich sylvanite mines there were a special temptation. A man could secure rich tellurides in a space scarcely greater than gold would occupy, and elaborate systems of espionage were adopted in the early days of the Straton's Independence and the Portland. Many scandals grew out of detective inquiries, and arrests of assayers, jewelers and others were frequent. Several times mine owners found their rich stores were visited by organized gangs of ore thieves who piled their calling while the regular workmen were off shift.

Tonopah and Goldfield are the scenes already of several criminal operations of this type. Some of the richest ore sent out of Goldfield has values sufficiently concentrated to make stealing it highly profitable. As a result, operators frequently send guards with ore trains, keeping a man with a gun in charge of a rich shipment from the time it leaves the mine bins until it is received by the smelters.

Mexicans have the laurel for ore stealing. Their sly methods have been the humor and study of the mining fraternity. When handling rich tellurides, it is an uncommon rule of the management to require Mexican peons to strip naked when leaving the mine, and then a careful examination of their anatomy is made to determine if they have specimens secreted. In rare instances they have been known to swallow exceptionally high-grade rock, by which means they were able to escape detection, as no manager has yet found it convenient to employ the Roentgen ray in his scrutines.

Diamond mines offer still more opportunities for thievery, and the Kaffir workers in South Africa are subjected to the most rigid rules applied to miners. At Kimberley and the Premier mines the Kaffirs are kept in great compounds for the period of their service contract, and before they are permitted to leave these steel-ribbed and concrete-lined apartments they must undergo an exhaustive examination, which extends to the anatomy as well as the clothing. That no negro may escape with a diamond in his stomach, it is said that the diamond mine managers have an intermediate apartment where the blacks are kept a sufficient time to determine this fact, after the first examination and before final departure.

SNAKE RIVER COARSE GOLD IS A DELUSION

The problem will be worked out in time, but until it is solved there is no use in getting excited over sensational stories of gold discoveries along the Snake.
