Property Owners May Enjoin Portland Consolidated From Abusing Franchise Rights.

CARRY PROTEST TO THE COUNCIL FOR ACTION

Company Announces It Will Build Single Track on Second and Third.

Property owners on Second street object to the Portland Consolidated Raily way company using the thoroughfare as a switch for cars crossing the Euradow street and Steel bridges, and will bring as injunction suit in the circuit court to restrain the corporation from carry-ing out its plans. The Portland Consolidated Railway company controls a franchise on Second and Third streets, calling for a single or a double track railway. The com-pany is now preparing to put in a single or a double track railway. The com-pany is now preparing to put in a single or a double track railway. A double track has been maintained on said street for a long pe-ried and has always been operated as a street car line with care running both ways, but said company is now to con-fine it to a single track, with care pass-ing over the same one way only, all of which is contrary to the terms of its franchise. We respectfully request that suitable action be taken at once to re-strain said company and its agents and employes from further altering or changing the same until the matter is heard and determined in the courts." 
