The Badger concentrator had a capacity of 70 tons daily prior to the additional installation, and will now be brought up to near the capacity of the largest mills of the district.

PLAN FOR ROSSLAND'S MINE CONSOLIDATION

Ronsland. B. C. May 4.—While there have been no recent development indicating an early merger of the Le Roi. Center Star and War Eagle mines, those connected with the properties state that this deal will be carried through when it is possible to get the controlling interests together. The plan of the Consolidation is for a \$10,000,000 corporation, in which former Le Roi interests will be represented by \$3,000,000 stock, Center Star by \$2,400,000, War Eagle \$2,000,000, the Trail smelter \$1,000,000 and the Snowshoe by \$100,000. This would involve the closing of the Northport smelter, which is located in the state of Washington, and doing all the smelting of the group at Trail, which now receives a good portion of the tonnage of the Center Star and War Eagle. There would be a heavy surplus eft for improvements and further equipment.


