BIG ATTENDANCE GLADLY PAYS INCREASED PRICE

Preparations for the Reception and Entertainment of Conductors on Sunday.

The department of exhibits is out with another law, calculated to make the tardy ones fall over themselves, in the interest of the exposition.

As there were 4,325 paid admissions to the fair grounds yesterday, the record for attendance in dollars and cents went shimmering.

Brought to Station, Then Taken to Baby Home, and All Mysteriously.

Police Do Not Learn Name of Woman Who Brings Him to Portland.

On the doorstep of the home of Dr. Morrison, a woman physician, at Salem, a tiny baby boy was found Saturday night.

The local police are exceedingly reticent about furnishing any details of the affair. The child was left on Dr. Morrison's doorstep shortly after dark and the doctor was called to the house.

There was not a mark on the clothing and not an article left in the basket which would afford a clue to the identity of the child's parents.

Receiving an affirmative answer, she hurried to the police station and left the baby in the care of Matron Simmons for a short time.

The baby is a healthy little fellow, with blue eyes and ruddy complexion. He has a good pair of lungs, and once or twice before he was taken from the care of the police matron made all within hearing aware of his existence.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OPENS AT LENTS

Bishop Breynfogel to Preside at Evangelical Association Meeting.

MARKS CLOSING OF MOST PROSPEROUS YEAR

Great Anxiety Manifested Over Serious Illness of Senior Presiding Elder.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lents, Or., May 8.—The 23d annual conference of the Evangelical association of Oregon and western Washington opened today at Lents with Bishop S. C. Breynfogel of Reading, Pennsylvania, presiding. He is the youngest of the bishops of the Evangelical association, being only 53 years of age.

The opening session will begin at 8 o'clock this evening at the Lents Evangelical church. Rev. F. W. Launer of Albany, Oregon, will preach. Tomorrow the examination of junior preachers will be held, and in the evening Rev. R. P. Jameson of Jefferson, Oregon, formerly a member of the Indiana conference, and superintendent of the Sunday School league of the southern district of the Oregon conference will preach.

The opening of this conference marks the close of one of the most prosperous years in the history of the church in the northwest. There has been a great harvest of souls, new missions have been opened, new churches have been built, the coffers of the church are unusually well filled, and all bids fair to this being the banner year for the Oregon conference.

Great anxiety is being felt both by the clergy and laity over the ill health of the senior presiding elder, Rev. N. Shupp of Woodlawn, who has for years been at the head of the work in Oregon and has borne the heaviest share of the burden.

"MISSOURI KID" IS HANGED AT UNION

The Most Notorious Criminal and Desperado Since Jesse James' Time Pays Penalty.

ROBBED BANK AND SHOT PINKERTON DETECTIVE

Sensational Escape From Prison by Jumping From Roof Sixty Feet to Ground.

Union, Mo., May 8.—William Rudolph, alias "Charles Gorney," the "Missouri Kid," who despite his youth is regarded as the most notorious criminal and desperado that Missouri has produced since the days of Jesse James, was hanged at 10 o'clock this morning for his part in the robbery of the Union bank and the subsequent murder of Pinkerton Detective J. Schumacher on January 22, 1903.

Charles J. Schumacher, a detective in the employ of the Pinkertons at St. Louis, was detailed on the case, and in the middle of January obtained a clue indicating that the burglars were then at Stanton, Mo. Schumacher obtained the necessary warrants, and on January 22, 1903, accompanied by two deputy sheriffs, planned to arrest the suspects, who were living in a deserted miners' boarding house situated on a hill.

After their flight a detective searched the house, and found a sheet of common writing paper on which was written several times "Fred Ludux." Search determined that Fred Ludux was a lieutenant in the United States army, but that he had been killed in Manila; that Fred Lewis of Hartford, Conn., had been a member of Ludux's company, and that Fred Lewis was George Collins of Hartford, Conn., whether the Pinkerton representatives, renewing their search, located Collins there associating with Rudolph.
