

### CIRCLES EARTH TO MEET HIS MOTHER

John Cordano Returns From Italy Which He Had Left Years Ago.

### TOURS EUROPE AFTER RECOVERY OF PARENT

Comes Back to Aid in Electing Harry Lane—Is Local Italian Leader.

John Cordano, deputy sheriff and king of "Little Italy," arrived in Portland yesterday a little more than an hour before Vice-President Fairbanks stepped off his special train, at the Union depot. He had a grip in one hand and a satchel in the other, and he started up Sixth street with an impetus that brought him against Count Candiani, the Italian consul of Portland. Handshaking followed. The count had dropped down to see the officer, and there were also several other Italians present. The first question asked was: "How's your mother, John?" The answer was:

"She's in the best of health." The question and answer tell almost the whole story of Cordano's trip to the old country. Three months ago he received news that his mother was very sick in Genoa, Italy. He had not seen her for 21 years, and he immediately hastened back to his old home. There he found her very sick. He remained with her until she had recovered, and then made a tour of England, France and Germany. In Paris he met Mrs. Moore, wife of ex-Circuit Clerk Dan J. Moore, who was visiting friends in Paris. Mrs. Moore was the only resident of Portland that he met. From England he made a quick trip to Portland. In London he had heard that Dr. Lane was a candidate for mayor against Mayor Williams, and determined to help the candidacy of the doctor along.

visions of the act, and to assist in preparing for this centennial exposition. As the official representative of the Lewis and Clark Centennial exposition commission, I deem it proper at this time to give you some information as to what part the state of Oregon has taken in behalf of this great enterprise through its commission. In determining the work to be done by the corporation the commission selected the construction of the buildings was selected as the state's part. We have, therefore, built upon the exposition grounds the following buildings:

The Forestry building, Foreign Exhibits building, Oriental and Educational building, Agricultural and Horticultural building, Mineral building, Machinery, Electricity and Transportation building, Auditorium, Fire Department, Administration building, colonnade entrance and the Oregon state building. These have been constructed at a cost of about \$225,000.

#### What the State Did.

In addition to the construction of these buildings, the commission expended \$50,000 at the Louisiana Purchase exposition and has spent about \$100,000 in the following exhibits: In the Forestry building is an exhibit of the woods and of the fish and game of the state. In the Oriental and Educational building an exhibit of the various educational departments of the state has been installed. In the Agricultural and Horticultural building we have an exhibit of agriculture and horticulture and in addition have solicited and raised throughout the state the sum of over \$100,000 for the preparation of county exhibits, and as a result there are now installed in this building exhibits from 24 of the 33 counties of Oregon. Coos county, which is 125 miles from the railroad, has constructed its own county building at an expense of nearly \$30,000. This county alone has contributed as her part of the exposition a sum of over \$20,000, and I cannot think that such a display of enthusiasm has ever been equaled by a county at any exposition in our country. These county exhibits will be of a most interesting character for our visitors to examine. They will give an opportunity to obtain information in reference to the interior of the state directly from residents therein.

#### Great Variety of Minerals.

There is an exhibit in the Mineral building which will be of interest to visitors, demonstrating as it does that there is no limit to the varieties of minerals to be found in this northwest country. The development at present is very limited, and I do not believe a more inviting field for the investor and prospector can be found in the United

#### Object of the Exposition.

This exposition was projected with the broad idea of calling attention to the great Pacific coast. We are not a selfish people, and our object is not to deprive other portions of the United States of population, but to offer from the surplus which we now have homes

Our state has no liabilities of any kind. Our taxes are reasonable, our laws are good, our schools are free, our public institutions are maintained upon a high standard of humanity. With all these advantages for our people, there is no reason why our state should not receive from the impression produced upon the visitor the great benefit which we anticipate, if our own people will do one half as well as their government.

Now I trust that we have the blessing of Almighty God on this great enterprise, and that the kindness and consideration of a generous public will overlook any little shortcomings that they may observe, giving due credit to the men who have assisted in its building; and that a most pleasant recollection may long linger in minds of all who visit the Lewis and Clark centennial exposition.

Ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the Lewis and Clark centennial exposition commission, and in name of the state of Oregon, I bid you a most hearty welcome.
