SWALLOWS ROUT UNCLE SAM



Little Black Spots Under Eaves of the Government Building Show Where Swallows Have Built Their Nests.

"Hello, Central, connect me with that detestable Mrs. Hightyer, who lives next the northwest corner and is always talking about her neighbors. I hope she isn't at home," said Mrs. Swallow, as she looked down the receiver of her party line, which is a part of the aerial service that has been installed under the eaves of the Government building at the exposition grounds.

"Hello, dear, is that you? I'm so glad, for I was afraid you might be out sailing this afternoon. I've just heard such good news—the custodian isn't going to tear down our homes after all. I believe it was simply newspaper talk in the first place, and don't believe the government ever had any serious intention of taking official notice of us.

"And come to think of it, it would be rather a petty thing for a big government to do—to go to war against this colony that never did take any interest in that sort of thing—wouldn't it?"

After thinking the matter over, government officials have decided that it is a rather insignificant occupation, so the swallows will be permitted to keep their homes under the eaves of the great structure on the peninsula. Myriads of mud nests have been built and are one of the most interesting features of the fair. Hundreds of visitors pause daily in their wanderings and watch the queer antics of the inhabitants of the aerial colony.

Frequent efforts have been made to dislodge them, but without success. The nests have been rebuilt as fast as

they were destroyed until the officials have decided to cease further efforts, for a time, at least.

"They actually seem to think they have more right in the building than we have," said Assistant Custodian Springer, "and it looks cruel to destroy the nests that they built with such care and labor. We have tried a number of times to get rid of them, but they always come back, so we have decided to let them stay for a time."

So bold have the swallows become that they have plastered the entire south end of the building with nests and both additions to the building have been covered for several weeks. During the day the air is filled with darting, speeding swallows that have made a feeding ground of the space between the building and the lake.

**PROUD TO ACT AS

F. M. Splawn Comes to Fair Wearing Land for Sale Sign.

LOOKS NEW TO MANY OF THE OTHER VISITORS

Pioneer Recalls a Weird, Hitherto Unpublished Adventure With Band of Indians.

"Land for Sale" is the strange device pinned on the coat of F. M. Splawn, 71 years of age, who visited the fair yesterday and today. Mr. Splawn has been a resident of Lyle, Klickitat county, Washington, for the past 34 years, and was one of the early pioneers of Oregon. He crossed the plains with an ox team in 1872.

"Of course I have land for sale, and that's why I wear this sign," he said. "I have a whole section of land, 640 acres, in Klickitat county, where I have lived for 34 years. Three years ago my wife died, and my seven children have all left home. So I have decided to sell and in order to let people know that I have land for sale I wear this sign."

Mr. Splawn is a veteran of the Rogue river Indian wars. When he came to Oregon he settled in Lane county; from there he moved to Polk county, and thence to Klickitat county, Washington.

"When they were preparing the history of the Rogue river wars they wrote to me for whatever experiences I could remember," he said. "I sent them an experience I had with our colonel and with a band of Indians that they never printed. And it certainly deserves to be printed, for it is a matter of history in which every survivor of the wars will be interested."

"Colonel Kelsey was in command of our regiment, and Captain Nowland commanded my company. Once Colonel Kelsey left me by myself surrounded by 30 or 40 red devils, and it was the experience of my life in getting away. It was that experience that the official history of the war did not publish. Colonel Kelsey had about 75 troops that he marched down a steep cliff near Rogue river. On the other side of the cliff suddenly appeared a large number of Indians. They yelled fiercely at us, swearing and cursing and daring us to come across.

"We fired at the Indians for a time and they returned the fire until Colonel Kelsey finally ordered four of us to remain there while he took the other troops back and brought reinforcements.

"I lay down in the brush, thinking the other three would do likewise. Finally the Indians saw me and came across the ravine. Seeing me alone they thought I was wounded and couldn't get away. I looked about for the other three men, but couldn't find them anywhere.

"The Indians set up a horrible yell as they surrounded me, so I 'ducked' into the brush again and hid there until dark. As soon as night fell I made a dash for it and ran the race of my life. I ran across country that ordinarily a man could not have walked across."

**POLITICAL KINGS
LOSE DOMINION**

Supremacy in North End Disappears When Sheriff's Deputies Watch Ballot Boxes.

HEELERS AND STRIKERS ARE AFRAID TO VOTE

For Once in History of Portland Denizens of Bad Lands Are Good.

Yesterday morning anxiety marked the faces of the motley groups always seen in the north end, centering around Frits, Erickson's and Blasier's resorts. Where usually are intense activity, marshaling of forces, and prompt obedience of orders from political chieftains, were nervous apprehension and heart-rending fear.

Something had happened that was not a familiar element to the denizens of the bad lands. Word had reached them that the terrors of outraged law awaited the man who attempted to violate the election statutes.

"Tell the boys they must be good today," was the command, backed by the official announcement of District Attorney Manning that he would prosecute violators of the election laws, and the declaration by Sheriff Word that deputies were stationed all over the city ready to arrest law-breakers.

"These men mean business," was the reluctant comment of the north enders; and the anxiety of the early forenoon hours degenerated into gloom profound as the day wore on, and it was apparent that the footers would travel a rocky road, if they attempted to vote illegally.

"Where's de dough?" was the frequent query, as red-nosed loaves stood on the sidewalk and hoped for the coming of the man with the sack. "Dis is somethin' awful. Not'in' doin'."

Little Voting in Bad Lands.

Through the bad lands district, from precinct to precinct, stalked Tom Word's deputies.

At 10 o'clock a vigilant watcher reported that men had been run into a building near the polling place of the ninth precinct. Deputy Sheriff Cordano drove straight to the man who was reported to be handling a sack in that house, and said:

"You must stop that."

No more votes were bought in that locality.

In the fourth precinct, said an early report, men were to be offered as candidates for affidavit voting, a bedraggled lot of unfortunate, whose faces glowed with the purple roses of whiskey.

Before five minutes had passed, five pairs of sharp eyes had gazed at the gang and the owners of the eyes stood by the polling booth, ready to challenge. One challenge was enough. Affidavit voting ceased after four had been sworn in, all of whom were men known to have a right to vote.

Sheriff Word heard that men were

passing in and out of the Fritz resort on Burnside street, and an investigation was made at once. The sheriff found the report was untrue, and bent on enforcing the law, just as quickly did he give Fritz a square deal by spreading the word that some one had maligned Fritz, and that he was observing the law.

Political Kings Tumble.

In all precincts which draw their strength from the bad lands they stood around the polling booths and yearned to slip in their ballots to receive the promised \$2.50 apiece, but the system was against them, and the number of illegal votes cast was reduced to a minimum. Often they gnashed their teeth with rage, and bosses of the precinct saw their prestige melt into nothing and they bowed in shame heads that once were raised aloft in pride at political kingship over subjects that knew no questioning of orders.

In the political history of this city has been recorded nothing quite like it. There was almost pathos in the situation. Some looked where the discomfited forces gathered in helpless confusion, and yet close to pity for the fallen leaders. But the orders were strict:

"Arrest any man guilty of violating the election laws." And the quondam boosters somehow seemed to realize that the day of their defeat had come. Loud boasts were heard that "there's nothing to it but Williams," but the tones were hollow and did not carry conviction to the hearers.

From the residence precincts poured in the reports that Lane was carrying the districts where are the homes of the people. It was as vinegar in fresh wounds, for the light voting in the bad lands by reason of prevention of fraudulent ballots was killing the hearts of their erstwhile proprietors.

It was an election to be remembered, when the portion of the city that once reeked with corruption on election day was taken in the strong grasp of the law by faithful sentinels and compelled to be good for one day at least.

**HIGH SCHOOL PLANS
AT LAST ACCEPTED**

Architect Jones' Chosen in Competition With Those of Goodrich and Huffman.

THREE-STORY BRICK AND STONE TRIMMINGS

Building Costing One Hundred Thousand Will Be Erected When Site is Chosen.

Plans of Architect Thomas J. Jones for the proposed east side High school were accepted by the city board of school directors yesterday afternoon. The other competitors were Captain W. W. Goodrich and J. P. Huffman.

The plans are for a three-story brick structure with stone trimmings, 174 by 184 feet in dimensions, with a large basement, the estimated cost of which is \$100,000. The features of the building are its large corridors, high ceilings, spacious classrooms and excellent lighting and ventilating facilities. An immense assembly hall 61 by 93 feet extends from the ground floor to the ceiling; light is had from an immense skylight 24 by 64 feet in the roof. A gallery extends around three sides of the assembly hall, which will have a seating capacity of 1,500. The auditorium is in the nature of a court set in the center of the main building. Around it are corridors ranging from 14 to 18 feet wide, while the classrooms and offices on the first and second floors are

arranged around the four sides of the court and open into the corridors.

On the first floor are 12 large classrooms with a seating capacity of 40 to 100 students each. On the second floor are 15 additional classrooms, a principal's room and two teachers' rooms. A chemical laboratory 28 by 64 feet, an art room 30 by 64 feet and two large literary society rooms for students are located on the third floor, and in addition to these are several large rooms which may be converted into either laboratories or classrooms. Each floor is supplied with the necessary cloak and storerooms and lavatories.

In the basement is a large room for manual training and a physical laboratory, lunch rooms, boys' and girls' rest rooms, and a large room in which will be the heating apparatus and other space which may be used as a gymnasium.

All the classrooms are so arranged that they have an abundance of light and the corridors have numerous openings for light and ventilation.

The site selected for the new High school is the block adjoining the Hawthorne school, but there has been considerable talk of securing two blocks in some other locality in order to preserve the vacant lot at the Hawthorne school as a playground. As soon as the location question is decided the contract for the building will be let.

N. L. EXHIBIT OF FINE ARTS**

Missouri will have an exhibit of fine arts at the Lewis and Clark exposition under the auspices of the St. Louis Artists' guild. For this purpose a large gallery is being erected in the rear of the Missouri state building. The gallery will be ready for occupancy by the end of the week.
