## HIGH SCHOOL PLANS AT LAST ACCEPTED

Architect Jones' Chosen in Competition With Those of Goodrich and Huffman.

THREE-STORY BRICK AND STONE TRIMMINGS

**Building Costing One Hundred** Thousand Will Be Erected When Site Is Chosen.

Plans of Architect Thomas J. Jones for the proposed east side High school were accepted by the city board of school directors yesterday afternoon. The other competitors were Captain W. W. Goodrich and J. P. Huffman.

The plans are for a three-story brick structure with stone trimmings, 174 by 184 feet in dimensions, with a large basement, the estimated cost of which is \$100,000. The features of the building are its large corridors, high ceilings, spacious classrooms and excellent lighting and ventilating facilities. An immense assembly hall 51 by 93 feet exing and ventilating facilities. An immense assembly hall 51 by 93 feet extends from the ground floor to the ceiling: light is had from an immense skylight 24 by 64 feet in the roof. A gallery extends around three sides of the assembly hall, which will have a seating capacity of 1,500. On the first floor are 12 large class-rooms with a seating capacity of 60 to 100 students each. On the second floor are 12 additional classrooms, a principal's room and two teachers' rooms. The site selected for the new High school is the block adjoining the Haw-thorne school, but there has been con-siderable talk of securing two blocks in some other locality in order to pre-serve the vacant lot at the Hawthorne school as a playeround. "I lay down in the brush, thinking "I lay down in the brush, thinking the other three would do likewise. Fi-nally the Indians saw me and came across the ravine. Seeing me alone they thought I was wounded and couldn't get away. I looked about for the other three men, but couldn't find them any-

"The Indians set up a horrible yell as they surrounded me, so I 'ducked' into the brush again and hid there until dark. As soon as night fell I made a dash for it and ran the race of my life. I ran across country that ordinarily a man could not have walked across."
