EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN ANNUAL MEETING

The Rt. Rev. B. Wistar Morris, who for many years has been the bishop of the diocese of Oregon, feels that his duties are resting too heavily on him in his old age, and has petitioned the Episcopal convention to appoint a co-adjutor at the annual meeting.

The matter has been discussed in an informal way, and on all sides regret is expressed that the bishop, who has been so prominently connected with Episcopalianism in Oregon since pioneer days, must lay aside some of his duties.

The matter will be brought up for formal discussion at the opening session of the annual convention at Trinity church this evening, and the petition will be granted, though the appointment will not be made at once.

The diocesan meeting of the woman's auxiliary was held this morning at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Upper Albin. Bishop Keaton of Olympia administered holy communion, and was assisted by Rev. Dr. Dawson of the entertaining church.

Eleven members of the auxiliary were present at the meeting and every diocese in the state sent representatives. Bishop Keaton and Mrs. J. J. Sellwood, secretary, and visiting clergymen addressed the afternoon meeting.

ASSESSMENTS IN TRUE CASH VALUES

Assessor Sigler Says He Desires to Equalize Business in Multnomah County.

IMPROVEMENTS WILL NOT PAY ALL THE TAXES

Taxes Will Not Be Greater This Year Than They Were Last.

County Assessor B. D. Sigler declares that he is making assessments for 1935 on the true cash value of property, and that in doing so he is complying with the state tax law.

Although the property valuation will be three times larger than that of last year, the assessor says that a more equitable apportionment of taxes among the several classes of property is desired in order that small householders and farmers may have lighter tax burdens than heretofore.

Assessor Sigler says his plan of assessing will diminish the share of taxes paid by improvements and increase that paid by unimproved city lots and cheap buildings in the business center and by personal property, such as merchandise, motor fixtures, gramophone, printing presses, boats, streetcar lines, railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, money notes, stocks, bonds, machinery, implements, vehicles and livestock.
