

SALE OF GLASSES LEADS TO ARREST

S. Nathan, Spectacle Seller at the Fair, Is Charged With Larceny, Taken into Custody and Released on Bonds Provided by Walter Reed and J. F. Clark.

NO PROSECUTIONS UNDER NEW LAW UNTIL AUGUST

Complaint is Made That Glasses That Cost From Twenty-Cents to Three Dollars a Pair Are Sold at the Exposition at From Thirty to Seventy-Five Dollars.

Until August 18, Oregon's board of examiners in optometry, created by the legislature in 1905, is powerless to handle the cases of opticians who defraud patrons. Victims of such opticians, therefore, must depend on the ordinary procedure against violators of the criminal statutes, and the district attorney has the only weapon whereby they may be punished. S. Nathan is accused in an information filed by the district attorney with the grand jury, and a check from M. Donagoe of Lewiston, Idaho, who was induced to purchase a pair of glasses which Nathan, an optician employed by the Walter Reed Optical Conception company at the exposition grounds, represented were worth \$75. Donagoe, who is wealthy, consulted an oculist and was informed that he had been defrauded. He complained to the district attorney.

What the New Law Means. The measure was filed by the governor without his signature, and it was necessary for it to remain with the secretary of state for 90 days before it became law. On May 15, therefore, it became law. The board was required to take action in prosecuting opticians who were practicing without certificates. After August 18 the board may cause prosecutions of all who have not been registered. The statute provides that every optician who was practicing in Oregon when the law was adopted need only apply for a certificate to practice his business on payment of a nominal fee.

FRIGHTFUL SLAUGHTER. (Continued from Page One.) There is no accurate way of ascertaining just how many fell during the day's fighting. Black Friday, however, will surpass the infamous Red Sunday in St. Petersburg and there is a belief that the killed and wounded, when all known, will reach the appalling total of 3,000. During the intervals in the killing the troopers turned their efforts to the burying of the dead. Hundreds of the dead, and it is stated not a few of the injured, were carried off to the cemetery in military wagons, the soldiers acting as undertakers for the people they had slain. In this manner scores of dead who will never be accounted for were disposed of. Great pits were dug and hastily covered up with a layer of blood-dyed soil. Military wagons rambled through the streets like tumblers, or after the manner of ambulances in time of plague. The streets were littered with bodies. Soldiers with fendish brutality prodded the dead with sword and bayonet to ascertain if life was extinct, and frequently destroyed what life remained. People Buried Alive. The bodies of men, women and children alike were gathered up and pitched in, and then with a crack of the whip, the lumbering wagons, carrying their ghastly loads, would rumble off to the second cemetery. Never before have such sights been witnessed when these bodies were dumped to the silent resting places of the dead. Silent resting places of the dead! Dead? Of the living also. Hundreds of women and children sought refuge in the cemeteries, where they believed they would be safe from the biting knout, the slashing bayonet, the death-dealing carbine. Behind tombstones they huddled, even in the sheltered places between the graves and the troopers sought them out there, drove them forth and added many recruits to the sickening heap of dead that lay awaiting burial in the yawning pits prepared. All Cemeteries Curled. Bonfires burned to furnish light for the troopers as they went about their work. A heavily loaded wagon would rumble into the cemetery under escort of a squadron of Cossacks, following.
