Mayor-Elect Lane Says He is Not Yet Ready to Make Appointments.

MEN MENTIONED FOR THE IMPORTANT PLACE

Captain Charles Gritzmacher May Get the Position, Temporarily, at Least.

The situation has been simplified to some extent by the withdrawal of John Lamont as a candidate.

Indications are that Captain Gritzmacher stands the best chance.

Captain Bailey is looked on as a good man, but Captain Gritzmacher appears to have the call over him in important particulars.

When asked if he had selected his chief of police and other appointees, Dr. Lane said:

I am taking all the time I possibly can, and will await the reception of official authority before making any announcements.

The water for this ditch will be taken from Balch canyon, although in the resolution of the water board it was stated that he would be prohibited from diverting any of the water from its natural channel.

Mr. Fitzgerald says that from time to time men have appeared in the police court whose fall was due to their parting with their money owing to the representations made to them by fortune tellers and clairvoyants.

NO ONE ADMITS HE HAS VISITED SHOW

SKILLET WAS USED BY LEWIS AND CLARK

Utensil Given by Explorers to Chief John's Father in Historical Society's Museum.

A very interesting collection of curios has been lent to the museum by Gilbert Tufty of Cathlamet, Washington, including numerous Indian trinkets and ancient coins and jewelry.

A sword presented to General Joseph Lane for special services rendered his country during the Mexican war has been placed in the custody of the historical society by Winifred Mosher.

A powder horn and coffee mill brought across the plains in 1826 from Danville, Illinois, by David Folsom has been presented to the museum by Mrs. Worrick, daughter of the pioneer.
