CITY STILL LEADS IN CEREAL EXPORTS

About Million and a Half Bushels of Wheat Sent Foreign Last Year.

OREGON FLOUR STAYS HUNGER OF THE ORIENT

Value of the Products Sent From Portland Exceeds Four Million Dollars.

During the cereal year which closes today Portland exported 1,474,117 bushels of wheat, worth \$4,404,030 and 764,868 barrels of flour, valued at \$2,991,341, making the aggregate value of the products considerably more than \$4,000,000.

In the matter of wheat exports the Willamette metropolis probably heads the list of all the ports in the United States. Last month this city was ahead by more than 100,000 bushels.

Portland has made this fine showing in the face of the fact that this has been one of the dullest years, so far as the exportation of wheat is concerned, in a decade. Thousands of bushels of the cereal were sent to domestic points; San Francisco drew very heavily, on Portland. Chicago and other inland cities took even more—a greater quantity, perhaps, than was sent across the seas.
