BEARD ADMITS PERJURY IN PROVING CLAIMS HE SAYS HE EXPECTED TO SELL TO WILLIAMSON OR GESNER

PAID ONLY FILING FEE

Williamson and Gesner Choose a Claim for Beard, He Says.

INTENDED TO SELL TO THEM WHEN PATENTED

Testimony Wrung From Unwilling Witness Damaging to the Three Men Accused in Land Fraud Cases.

From the lips of unwilling witnesses United States District Attorney Heney is wringing the evidence on which he expects to convict Congressman J. N. Williamson, Dr. Van Gesner and Marlon R. Biggs, on trial in the federal court on the charge of conspiracy and subornation of perjury.

Genesee Becomes Frighthead. According to the testimony, Genesee finally became apprehensive of trouble on account of this and other timber entries for which he had advanced the costs of making proof, and he wrote to Beard advising him to relinquish his claim.

At the conclusion of the morning session Judge De Haven announced that the case would be continued until 2 o'clock Monday afternoon in order to allow arguments to be heard Monday morning on the motion of Senator Mitchell for a new trial.

The particular paragraph which is deemed important states that many timber entries had come under suspicion and there was reason to believe that the claimants had made contracts to sell before completing their proofs, and it was intimated that in such cases criminal prosecutions might be commenced by the government.

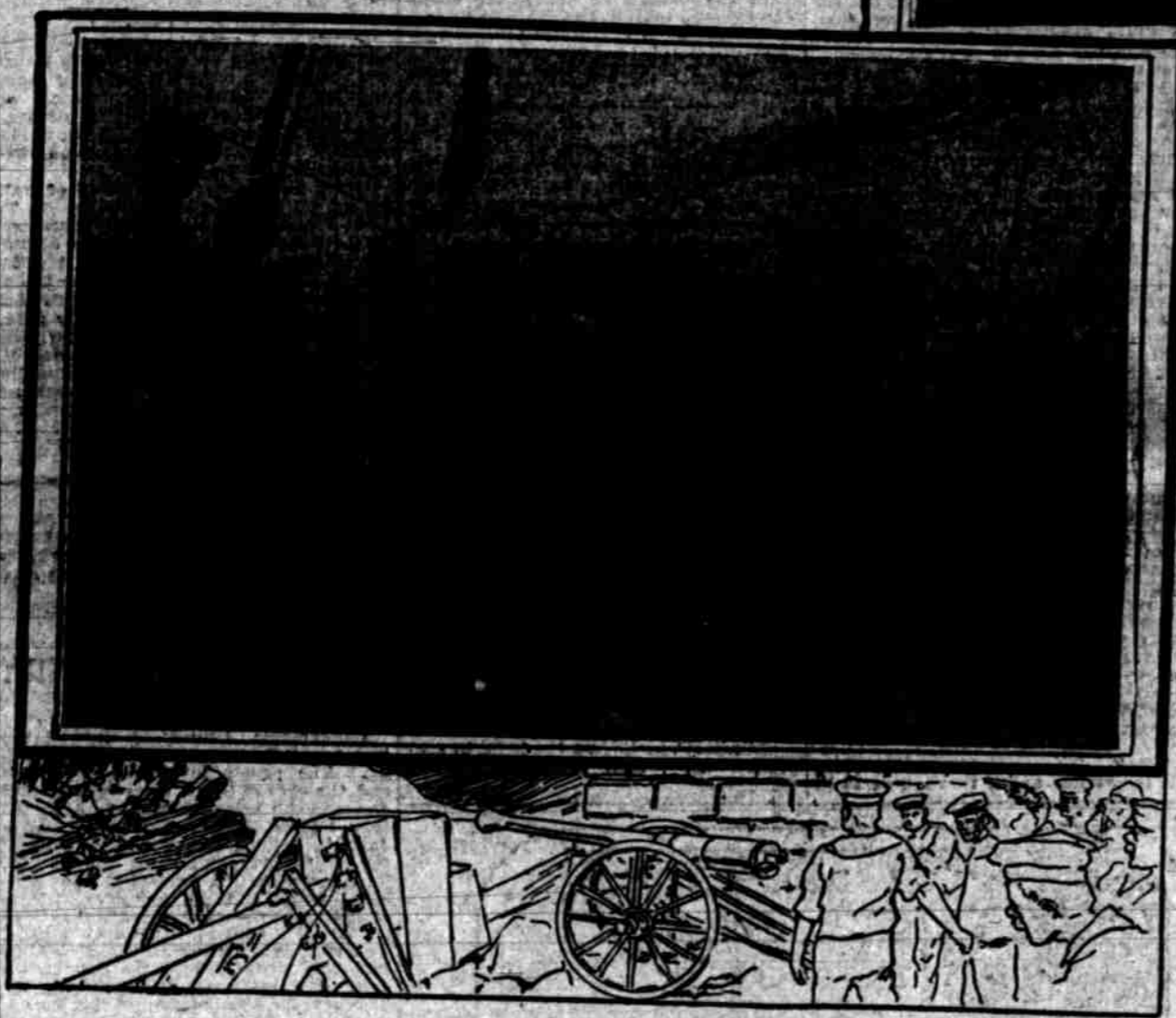
Searching Mutual's Record

(Journal Special Service.) New York, July 8.—Under the direction of the state department of insurance three experts this morning began an investigation of the Mutual Life Insurance company. The investigation arises from dissensions with regard to the status of insurance companies following the disclosures in the Equitable scandal.

The Mutual Life Insurance company is the third largest life insurance company in the United States. On January 1, 1904, it had \$1,445,228,681 of life insurance in force. Its gross assets amounted to \$401,821,662. During the year closing on that date its earnings were \$172,015,550. Its dividends were \$110,020,706, of which \$61,994,484 was retained by the company's stockholders.

Superintendent Hendricks said today: "Every insurance company should be examined as was the Equitable. They may seem clean, but there is more than a suspicion that in their management they are regarded as personal assets to be used to enrich the person in control. Every company must be moved from a position where Wall street influences control.

"The only remedy for existing evils is complete mutualization with the elimination of the stock."
