

The minimum depth of water on the Columbia river bar is 24 feet, and that is in a very limited area. Over the greater part the depth is from 26 to 30 test at low water, an increase of more than one foot since the soundings were taken a year ago. These facts are issued by the United States engineers.

With the extension of the jetty there is said to be no doubt that a sufficient outward current will be formed to wash the accumulation of gravel and send out to tee, increasing the channel to a minimum depth of at least 30 feet of water at the zere mark.
