APPROVED BY RIKSDAG

Committee Report Refusing to Recognize Separation of Norway is Adopted by Swedish Parliament.

EMPEROR WILLIAM WILL VISIT KING CHRISTIAN

Kaiser to Induce Aged King to Refrain From Permitting Any of His Family to Ascend Norwegian Throne and to Act in Interest of Sweden While at Copenhagen.

(Journal Special Service.) Stockholm, Sweden, July 22.—Both houses of the riksdag held secret sessions today to discuss the report of the committee dealing with the crisis between Norway and Sweden.

It is stated on excellent authority that the riksdag will signify its willingness to negotiate with Norway for a dissolution of the union if the newly elected storting requests a repeal of the union after a popular vote has been taken.

No announcement has been made of the appointment of a new ministry by King Oscar and the appointment is anxiously awaited as having great bearing upon the situation.

Copenhagen, July 22.—It is announced that Emperor William will visit King Christian at an early date.

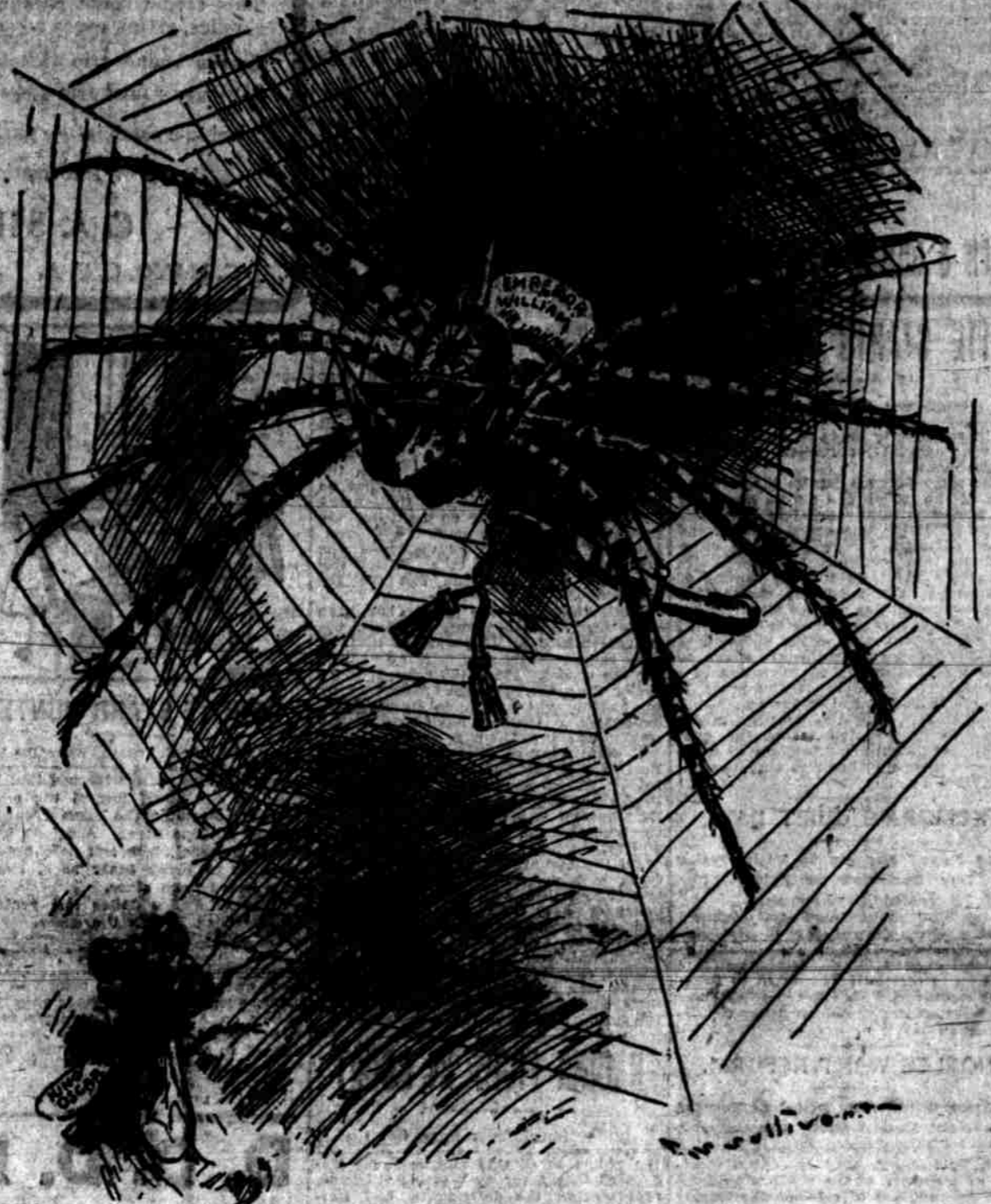
NATIONAL COMMANDER CARNAHAN IS DYING

24 FEET OF WATER IN SHALLOWEST PART OF COLUMBIA RIVER BAR

Splendid Results From the Construction of the Jetty and in Very Short Time Greatest Freighters in World Will Be Able to Cross in Safety.

ERNEST STARR HUNTED

Nephew of Congressman Williamson Wanted as Witness Against Him Found to Be Missing.

TRACED TO EUGENE THENCE TO MOUNTAINS

O'Leary, a Hotel Keeper at McKenzie Bridge, Suspected of Hiding Him at a Summer Resort, is Ordered Placed Under Arrest—A Long Chase.

Ernest Starr, an important witness for the government in the first trial of Congressman Williamson, Dr. Van Gesner and Marion R. Biggs, has disappeared and a number of deputy marshals and secret service men are in hot pursuit of him to bring him back to testify in the second trial of the case.

Starr is a nephew of Congressman Williamson and for several years has been employed by the firm of Williamson & Gesner. He was one of the men who were induced to take up timber claims on the expectation of conveying them as soon as patented to Williamson and his partner.

It was noticeable on the former trial that Starr was exceedingly unwilling to testify against the defendants. It is in the opinion of the government officials that he has had to escape giving testimony against them a second time.

The following dispatch was received this afternoon from Eugene, Ore., July 22.—Ernest Starr of Prineville, nephew of Congressman Williamson, and one of the government's most important witnesses against the conspirators in the present land fraud trial, is being pursued across the country east of Eugene by a deputy United States marshal, assisted by the local officers.

2,500 WOMEN STAMPEDE IN BARGAIN COUNTER SALE

Eight Seriously Hurt in Mad Rush to Secure Ten-Cent Overalls and Shirts.

Eight women were seriously hurt in the mad rush to secure overalls or shirts for their better halves, and a reserve force of police was called out.

Mrs. Mary Hoover was the worst hurt of the women caught in the crush. She fainted at the head of a railway and would have fallen to the lower floor had the crowd not been too dense to allow her to fall.

Chief Russian Plenipotentiary Leaves Cherborg for America to Attend Peace Conference at Washington.

RUSSIAN NOBLES FAVOR REFORMING THE EMPIRE

Minister Takahira—Closeted With President Roosevelt Arranging Reception of Komura—Piece of Bone Successfully Removed From Head of Admiral Rojstvensky.

(Journal Special Service.) Cherborg, July 22.—M. Witte, who is to act as chief Russian plenipotentiary in the coming peace conference with the Japanese representatives at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, sailed for New York today on the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse of the North German Lloyd line.

Witte's party will include his secretary, Professor de Martens, the famous authority on international law of the University of St. Petersburg; M. Platonov, director of the plenipotentiaries' department; M. Korotkov, formerly secretary of the legation at Peking; Major-General Yermoloff, military attaché at London; and M. Baboboff and M. Semoloff of the Russian foreign office.

VISITS THE PRESIDENT.

Minister Takahira Closeted With Roosevelt—Arranging for Conference.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 22.—Minister Takahira arrived from New York this morning and was conveyed in the president's carriage to Sagamore Hill. Plans for the coming peace conference will be discussed this afternoon.

COUNTRY OF MISRULE.

Demands Congress Enacts Government—Demands Constitutional Government.

NEGRO BUYS A HOME NEXT TO EXECUTIVE MANSION

People of Kansas Offended at Attitude of Colored Man Toward Governor.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Topeka, Kan., July 22.—Topeka's Four Hundred are deeply outraged because Nick Chiles, a negro, has purchased a home near the executive mansion.

Chiles' affront, as it is characterized by the "upper crust" of society, is attributed to Governor Hoch's cordiality toward Booker T. Washington last winter, when the governor walked up the aisle of the representative hall arm in arm with Washington.

Hoch also met Booker T. T. Washington, a noted colored educator, at the Kansas club banquet in January.

RACING FIGHT IN COURT

Factions That Have Been Squabbling for Profits of Poolselling at Irvington Will Tell Troubles to Judge Frazer

BUT THE ODDS WILL BE POSTED THIS AFTERNOON

Action Taken by Captain Spencer, Attorney in Fact for Mrs. Ryan, Owner of the Track—A Continuance Is Granted in the Police Court to Pool Sellers Arrested.

Whether or not pools may be sold on horse races at the Irvington track is a question which must be decided tomorrow by Arthur L. Frazer, presiding judge of the circuit court.

Details action intended to force the issue was taken in the circuit court this morning by Captain E. W. Spencer, agent and attorney in fact for Mrs. Elizabeth Ryan, owner of the track, on discovering that Fabian tactics were being adopted by the Kilmarnock Fair association in the police court.

No Allegations, Defendants Say. It is alleged by the defendant association that the nuisance statute, invoked by Sheriff Word in stopping pool selling in the city, does not apply to a race track, where the horses are in sight of the bettor, and in the opinion delivered by M. C. George, formerly presiding judge of the circuit court, from whose decision an appeal was taken, it was indicated that there was considerable doubt as to whether the statute was meant to cover the selling of pools at a racing course.

The action in the circuit court was not taken by Captain Spencer and his attorney until after they had gone to the track this afternoon.

Pool selling at the track this afternoon is not affected by the writ, and will continue until such time as the court may decree that it is illegal.
