OREGON'S DEEPEST MINE IS RICH

Definite Information That the Bonanza Still Has High-Grade Rock.

AL GEISER PROVES THAT MINING IS NOT ALL LUCK

While Opening New Ore Reserves Management Is Repairing Forty-Stamp Mill and Putting Sinking Plant in Working Shape.

Geseir, Or., July 26.—No doubt remains in the minds of the public hereabout that Albert Geiser has struck high-grade ore in the Bonanza mine. There have been many rumors to the

effect that "Geiser's luck was with him again," and his operation of 20 to 25 stamps for the past month gave the best corroboration that could be had for the mining man. More definite information is now given out that there is six feet of unusually rich ore in the first or second shaft level, where the new manager has been drifting parallel to the old ore shoot from which several hundred thousand dollars was taken under the Thatcher regime. A portion of the face in the drift has rich shipping rock, and in recent work the shoot has improved in a remarkable manner. The effect of Mr. Geiser's work at the Bonanza has been remarkable on the district. Before he came, this the deepest mine in Oregon, was pointed to as an abandoned property, and the reflection on the state's mineral resources when deep work was undertaken could not be overcome. The Bonanza's main shaft has a vertical depth of 1,400 feet. When Manager J. A. Thatcher suspended work he began dismantling the plant, and actually blew out one battery of stamps in the 40-stamp mill that he might secure the trifling sum obtainable for the junk. It has been necessary to reconstruct a portion of the plant, but while prosecuting development work Mr. Geiser has been devoting much energy to putting both the mill and sinking plant in good condition. He will soon have the entire property in working shape, and meanwhile is developing ore that is equal to that of the old days when the Bonanza stood at the head of the producing list. This ore deposit occurs in a considerable fracture zone. It is only by thorough crosscutting and careful development of many ore bodies, which seem to be mere streaks, that the shoots are all revealed. It is found that the former manager did little exploratory work further than to sink on the shoot that had been opened when he took charge, and the success of Mr. Geiser is due to his better conception of the ore occurrence and willingness to risk development for new shoots. It is locally believed that the full 40 stamps will be in commission soon, when eastern Oregon will have one of the best examples given the public of the importance of management in the quest for nature's treasured precious metals.

ENLARGING HOGAN MILL.

Great Idaho Plant Is Promised Capacity of Thousand Tons Daily.

Elk City, Idaho, July 26.—Operations at the big Hogan mine, near here, under the management of William Hogan, grow in magnitude and the company continues to improve and enlarge the crushing and leaching plant. The exact capacity of the plant is not made public, but it is asserted that this mill will be handling 1,000 tons daily before the management finishes the improvements being prosecuted steadily. The Hogan has Idaho's coal record, this being attained while operating with a 20-stamp mill and breaking down ore by means of a glory hole. With the greater mill, which leaches a heavy proportion of the values, it is believed that the low figure previously attained, slightly more than 70 cents a ton for mining and milling, may be further reduced.

PIONEER ORE ENGINE.

Copper King Traction Outfit at Chewelah, Wash., Ready for the Road.
The management of the Copper King Mining company, operating at Chewelah, Washington, is installing a traction engine with ore cars for delivering ore from the mine to the railway station. The cars will handle about 50 tons a trip, and it is the purpose of the management to make two trips daily, giving

SELF-GOVERNMENT IS DEMANDED

Inhabitants of Porto Rico Petition Congress for Amendments in Foraker Law.

WOULD HAVE GOVERNOR APPOINT ALL OFFICIALS

Organization of a Senate Requested, With Same Privileges as House—To Have Federal Officers Form Part of Executive Council.

San Juan, Porto Rico, July 26.—Delegates representing 45 out of 44 municipalities of Porto Rico, comprising both political parties, memorialized the president and congress last night with a view to bring about radical changes in the government of the island. The memorial recites that this is the seventh anniversary of the American invasion of Porto Rico and that the power still rests with the executive council, whose members are appointed by President Roosevelt.

"These heads of departments," it says, "arrive here knowing nothing of the language, customs or needs of the country, and 24 hours after disembarking take their seats in the executive council and determine the fate of the island."

The memorial calls for no change in the composition of the house of delegates, which consists of 35 members elected by the people, but demands the following amendments to the Foraker law:

First—The organization of an insular senate, to be composed of two senators each from seven districts, in place of the executive council.

Second—That the proposed senate and house possess the same privileges granted to the house under the Foraker law.

Third—That the secretary of Porto Rico, the attorney-general, the treasurer, the auditor, the commissioner of education and the commissioner of the interior continue in their present offices under the present titles, but that they form no part of the executive council.

Fourth—That the officials named be appointed by the governor with the consent of the insular senate and not by the president of the United States.

The convention also adopted a petition for presentation to the insular legislature for the protection of the municipalities and the granting to them of autonomy.

To Wind Up Anaconda.

Butte, Mont., July 26.—The Anaconda company, one of the early corporations organized by the late Marcus Daly, and out of which the present Anaconda company of the Amalgamated Copper company was formed, served notice today that it had lowered its capital stock from \$1,000,000 to \$100,000 preparatory to closing up the affairs of the company.

ALBANY ENTERTAINS THE OHIO CAPITALISTS

Governor Herrick and Party Inspect Oregon Irrigation and Resources.

Albany, Or., July 26.—Governor Myron T. Herrick and party, consisting of Ohio capitalists, who have spent the past two weeks in the neighborhood of Bend inspecting the property of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company, arrived in this city last evening. They drove from Shaniko to Madras, going by automobile to Bend, where they spent a week in that section fishing, camping and inspecting the system of irrigation canals. Last Sunday morning they started for the Willamette valley by team, and at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon arrived at Lebanon, where their private car met them and brought them to this city, where the night was spent.

On their arrival here the party was presented with a basket of roses and a fine basket of fruits, the best to be obtained in the local market, the gift of the Albany Commercial club. At 7:30 o'clock Dr. M. H. Ellis, president of the Commercial club, with carriage, called for the party and drove it over the city and to points of interest near by, and finally wound up at the Alco club, where a number of business men of the city met the distinguished visitors. Here an hour was pleasantly spent in an informal reception. The visitors left Albany this morning for Portland.

Governor Herrick expressed his pleasure at the reception accorded him in this city.

FARMERS DISCUSS LAND LEASES WITH INDIANS

Pendleton, Or., July 26.—A meeting of farmers who have leases on Indian lands was held at the Agency school Sunday afternoon with R. E. Valentine, special inspector of Indian affairs. The question of leases was discussed and a general understanding was arrived at between the persons concerned. A few Indians took part in the discussion. So far as the matter of leases is concerned, affairs on the reservation now seem to be satisfactorily adjusted.

Inspector Valentine will remain for a week or ten days before he returns to Washington. During his official visit he has been investigating the ruction between the Indian agent and the clerk at the agency.
