SCANDINAVIAN DAY IS CELEBRATED

Music and Eloquence Continue to Make Occasion Notable in Fair's History.

ATTENDANCE IS GREAT IN HONOR OF EVENT

Governor Chamberlain Welcomes the Great Throng and Tells of Part the Celebrants Played in Building the Commonwealths of Northwest.

Scandinavian, Southern California and Columbia County day drew to the exposition a crowd of 9,047 up to 11:30 this forenoon, with every prospect of a total attendance of not less than 20,000. Yesterday the total admissions were 15,847, an improvement over the day before.

STARR CAPTURED AND MUST TAKE STAND AGAINST UNCLE

Nephew of Congressman Williamson Taken in a Sheep-Camp and Will Testify Monday—Then Final Argument Will Begin—Honey and Judge Have Tilt.

Testimony for both prosecution and defense in the trial of Congressman Williamson and his co-defendants in the federal court was practically concluded this morning and argument to the jury will begin on Monday.

Several witnesses were called by District Attorney Honey to rebut statements made by Gesner and Biggs, and the court was then informed that the government had no further evidence to offer with the exception of the witness Ernest Starr, who would take the stand Monday morning. An adjournment was thereupon taken until that time.

MOSES A. GUNST PAYS \$90,000 FOR WASHINGTON STREET PROPERTY

Moses A. Gunst of San Francisco today bought for \$90,000 a quarter block of the L. G. Prunder property at the northwest corner of Eleventh and Washington streets. The purchase was made through Russell & Blyth and John D. Wilcox, acting as agents for a local syndicate which a month ago purchased the entire half block on Eleventh street from M. Pfunder for \$100,000.

PEASANTS OF CEBU ARE EATING CHILDREN

(Journal Special Service.) Manila, July 29.—Drouth has destroyed the harvests of Cebu and the peasants are in a starving condition eating roots, copra and dogs. So terrible is the condition that cases are reported where families killed and devoured their youngest children. Two authentic cases of cannibalism are known to have occurred and many others are reported.

FATAL RIOTING AT NIJN NOVGOROD

Sixteen Killed and Fifty-Three Injured in Clashes Between People and Troops.

(Journal Special Service.) St. Petersburg, July 29.—Rioting on an extensive scale has continued for the last four days at Nijn Novgorod, in Central Russia on the Volga. Workmen and peasants attacked houses and stores, looting and burning, and all attempts of the authorities to quell the disorder has resulted in failure.
