

ESSECK BEATS DILLON'S NINE

Interesting Game in Which Portland Excelled in Every Department of the Sport

VAN BUREN'S CATCH FEATURE OF CONTEST

Long-Legged Center-Fielder Makes Remarkable Catch of Dillon's Drive and Saves Two Scores—Mitchell's Home Run Stirs the Crowd.

Portland 4, Los Angeles 3. Batteries—Essock and McLean, Gray and Spies.

Bill Essock won his game yesterday, and as the old man of the forest would say, Bill was the "real candy." So long as "candy" isn't pasted on the face of a man, it is permitted in sports. The score was no great thing, but it is hardly necessary to talk about it, inasmuch as the Angels garnered nothing in their own batted attempts. It was a game full of features, and the honors of the day must necessarily go to Edward "Pats" Van Buren for his phenomenal catch of Dillon's liner in the sixth inning. This catch will linger in the memories of those who witnessed it, a long time. It is doubtful if any such play will ever be pulled off again at Recreation park. Bernard and Smith were on second and first, with Dillon up. One man was dead and the outlook for a tally was bright. The Asiatic center picked out one of Essock's spit balls and gave it a terrific bang. Away went the spaulding with the speed of light toward the center field fence. It looked good for a double at least. Van Buren started for the fence. His long leaping fair skipped across the outfield. The ball appeared to be going in the direction of the New York building. A vagrant sparrow, flying on the wing, narrowly escaped a collision with the speeding sphere. Bernard and Smith had already crossed the plate and were sitting on the bench. Dillon was digging spikes holes in the soil around third base, turning the corner for home. It meant a tie score. The crowd was in suspense. All that could be seen in the outfield was Van Buren's feeling form. He was after the ball. After a long and exciting chase, the ball began to descend. Van was still a respectable distance from the ball. Just as it was about to hit the fence he leaped into the air and, extending his long left arm, managed to place his fingers on it to the surprise of spectators and the astonishment of all, the ball struck.

The Los Angeles players had nearly forgotten about the incident until they saw Van return the ball to second base, completing a double play. The reality of the play upon them that a great play had been accomplished, and "Daddy Longlegs" got a great ovation. Van smiled like a farmer's boy who had just received his first glance from a girl. Of course, the ball game was won. Essock was real devilish with the spit ball and played all sorts of pranks with the chosen ones. In the eighth inning an unusual thing happened. Two men were on bases, and McLean doubled, Essock scoring. McLean ran Householder down on third and a scow commenced on Eddie between third and home. Spies threw to Smith and Smith threw to Spies, and Dolly Gray crossed the plate. There was plenty of fun, and Eddie rushed for home and Spies threw to Dolly to catch him. Instead of Gray holding the ball, he let it go through his hands to the grandstand, and both men scored. Branch Rickey named and Mr. "Brain Ram" was freed and expected from the sport. Captain Dillon said that "Slats" looked like a beer wagon, and "Slats" resented the impropriety by firing the Leo Leo captain and relegating him to the grandstand. Tommas and Essock succeeded the belligerents and the game proceeded. There were other features, but life is too short to tell them all in one sitting. Mitchell drove out a home run in the third inning, and with two down, Essock scored McLean and Hoffman on his double. Hoffman made good at third. He had four chances, one of which was a corking one-handed stop, got three bases on balls, made one hit and scored. He is fast on the bases and made a good impression. Flood caught him napping at first on a quick return from Spies. The contest was thoroughly interesting. Branch, Bernard and Smith made seven out of the eight hits recorded to Los Angeles. 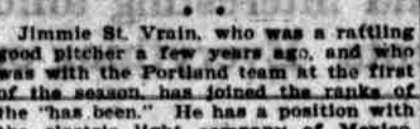

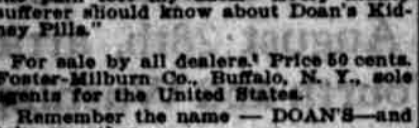
CAN IDENTIFY RAILROAD WORKERS POINTED OUT

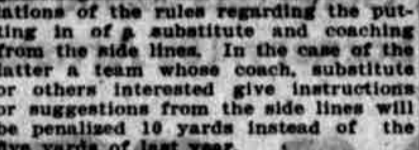

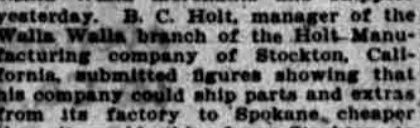

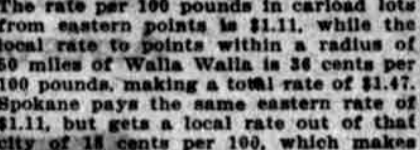
