MUCH COMMENT OVER SUICIDE OF CRISWELL

Society Welcomes Interesting Family of New Russian Ambassador-Thomas F. Walsh Getting Glory Out of Law Suit.

(Washington, D. C., Aug. 24.—Now that President Roosevelt has yielded on the question of the revision of the tariff, there is much discussion as to the attitude he will take during the coming session of congress, on that other vital question which is before the country, namely, the regulation—of railroad freight rates. It is stated on well reliable authority that the president has abandoned the idea of securing tariff revision and his views on the question have undergone considerable modification. The president was as emphatic earlier in the recess of congress on the question of tariff revision as he was on the railroad rate legislation, and it is argued if he allowed his backbone to weaken on the one question he is likely to do so on the other.

Legislation of positive benefit in regard to the control of the railroads is hardly expected during the next seasion of congress by those who have been watching the several months of the congressional recess.

watching the situation as it has developed during the several months of the congressional recess.

The hearings before the senate committee on interstate commerce might be called ex parte solely. Witnesses who were against the railroads were treated with but scant courteey, while every facility was afforded the very large number of skilled and well-informed witnesses who were on hand to testify in behalf of the railroads. The railroads themselves have not been idle during the recess, and are at this moment exceedingly active in working up their ceedingly active

There is scarcely a member of congress who during the present recess has not been, or will not be, the recipient of "courtesies" from the railroad companies in the matter of free transportation; so it has been also with nearly every person holding a prominent place in the government service. Free transportation "courtesies" have also been liberally extended to members of the press generally. In addition to this the railroads have maintained an efficient bureau to disseminate information, statistics and literature favorable to their side of the question. They have as far as possible eliminated the rate regulation question from politics, and the most

to the railroads.

It is possible, during the coming session of congress, that there will be a revolt in the house against the one-man power of the speaker. Criswell had a long and varied career in newspaper work throughout the United States. He was the original humorist of the Oil City Derrick, and attracted wide notice for the pithy articles he wrote for that paper. About a year ago he secured an interest in the New Yorker, which had been established five years before by a Tammany politician. Criswell changed the character of the paper and ran it on the lines of Town Topics. He wrote bitterly and savagely, and was called upon frequently for retraction and apologies. He was evidently of too fine a fiber for the work he was doing, and while he managed to get out of Much Comment Over Suicide. and while he managed to get out of personal difficulties he could not make peace with his own conscience, and to stop its tortures he took his own life.

Baron Rosen, the new Russian ambassador, has brought to this country an interesting family in his wife and young daughter. Although Mile. Rosen is just 17, and consequently too young to be declared in society, she is enjoying a great many pleasures and attends many tuncheons and dinners with her mother. Washington will welcome this new hostess of the Russian embassy and her daughter. In Russia young women do not enter society until presented, and as Mile. Rosen is too young for that ceremony. Washington will have to wait for her in the official set, although she will have no lack of good times in the younger set.
