To the north sixty miles is Mount Adams, 12,470 feet high; on Puget Sound, one hundred and fifty miles away, is Mount Rainier, 14,440 feet, and to the west is Mount St. Helens, 9,750 feet, saying nothing of the lesser peaks. SECOND HERCULES SALE MADE

One Sixty Fourth Taken on
Basis of Four Million Dol-
lars' Valuation.

MANAGER SAYS HIS
MINE IS WORTH MORE

Wife of Early Stockholder Disposes
of Her Interest in Coeur d'Alene
Bonanza to Those Who Hold the
Majority of Stock.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Spokane, Wash., Sept. 3.—Another
one-sixty-fourth interest in the famous
Hercules mine in the Coeur d'Alene,
Idaho, is being sold for \$42,500. This
share is to be purchased by the Paulson-
Hutton interests, which last week pur-
chased a one-sixty-fourth interest of
H. F. Samuels.
The past year this one-sixty-fourth
interest has paid \$739 a month in divi-
dends. This is the richest mine in the
Coeur d'Alene, and its great profits are
made entirely from crude ore, as it is
taken from the mine. These two trans-
fers are the only ones that have been
made since the property became a pro-
ducer.
The sale was by Mrs. Bickerton, the
divorced wife of H. F. Samuels, who last
week sold his one-sixty-fourth interest
to the same people. The basis of valua-

tion indicated by the sale is \$4,900,000
for the entire mine. As the dividends
from the property last year were \$476,-
000 without a concentrator, it is gener-
ally conceded that this sale is at a sacri-
fice figure. H. L. Day, one of the heav-
iest owners and manager of the Her-
cules, was quoted recently in the state-
ment that the company regarded its
mine as worth fully \$10,000,000. Paul-
son-Hutton interests have an easy ma-
jority of Hercules stock with the recent
purchases.

ANOTHER DRILL HERE.

Portland Company Operating in Baker
County Resumes Standard Big Plant.
A Keystone prospecting drill for the
Western Exploration & Dredging com-
pany, which has headquarters here, but
operates in Baker county, has been re-
ceived and will be put at work soon.
The company's land is in Burnt River
valley, where there has been a heavy
placer work for a half-century. George
W. Kimball, a dredge expert from
Placerville, California, is to have charge
of the prospecting work, which will be
prosecuted thoroughly before any addi-
tional equipment is installed.

MINING NOTES.

Summing up the work recently done
at the Grants Pass, in British Colum-
bia, the Boston News Bureau says the
company earned in June \$84,000 from a
production of 1,200,000 pounds of cop-
per, in May \$97,000 from 1,325,000
pounds, and for July the earnings
will be close to \$100,000. The average
for the past three or four months, with
six furnaces, has been \$92,000, or 50
cents a share, which would make the
annual earnings \$1,100,000. With the
new furnaces it is estimated that the
earnings will be \$125,000 a month, or
\$1.25 a share on 1,350,000 shares.

Grants Pass, Or., Sept. 3.—Almond
Baker and J. E. Chappell of Goldenshil,
Washington, president and secretary,
respectively, of the Grants Pass Marble
& Lime company, are looking after the
interests of the company. They are
pleased with the showing made at the
quarry and the quality and quantity of
lime manufactured.

N. B. Nye, who owns a quartz prop-
erty near the Big Foots creek dredging
plant, Douglas county, said this morning
that when he left the district to visit
the fair the dredge management was
busy installing the electric equipment.
He thought it would be a month before
the plant would be ready to resume
again, but said when work did com-
mence with the improved dredge the
Champlin boat would be ready to do
some of the most effective work ever
recorded on the coast. This boat has
8-foot buckets, and is a marvel in the
way of handling earth with low power
requirements. When electricity is used
greater economy in this respect is ex-
pected.

A. D. Leroy, one of the incorporators
of the Bohemia Smelting & Refining
company, says the operators of the
camp are serious in the desire to get
a smelting plant near their properties.
According to Mr. Leroy there is a large

amount of low-grade base ore in the
district which will not stand shipment,
and which cannot be leached. He thinks
the only hope of ever handling it is to
have a matting plant erected at a con-
venient point, and says that the mining
men of the camp are anxious to encour-
age such an enterprise.

GLASS PLANTS REOPEN— WORKERS WIN STRIKE

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 3.—Most of the
glass manufacturers in the glass dis-
trict have signed the Burns wage scale
and everything is in readiness for the
resumption. The wage question may be
considered satisfactorily settled, and be-
ginning with today over 10,000 men will
be given employment in the plants which
have resumed work under the new scale.
During the period of inactivity many of
the large manufacturers gave their
plants a thorough overhauling and made
all necessary repairs so as to be able to
take up work with their furnaces, etc.,
in good condition.

AMERICAN SOLDIERS IN PEACEFUL INVASION

Guard, arrived here from Buffalo, New
York, this morning, accompanied by a
band of 50 pieces. The visiting soldiers,
who carried their arms and complete

enormous crowd, which cheered them
when they stepped from the train. The
officers of the Queen's Own regiment
were assembled at the station and gave
the American officers a hearty welcome.
The visiting soldiers marched, with
the band playing martial airs, to their
camping ground, and all along the line
of march they were cheered by the
crowds. In the afternoon they will be
presented to Lord Grey.
