Keenest Interest Prevails in the Meeting of These Crack Three-Year-Olds in the Annual Champion Stakes on Saturday Next.

New York, Sept. 5.—There is no doubt that the season which opened at Sheepshead Bay week ago last Saturday with the rich Futurity will be the greatest in the history of metropolitan racing. Never have there been so many high-class horses stabled at the local tracks, never has there been such large fields entered for the over-night events, never have there been such crowds at the track, and never has there been such brisk betting.

From now on until the close of the season on the big tracks, at Belmont Park the fields that will compete will undoubtedly be the heaviest ever known. It is also a notable fact that in no past year have the rich stakes for the fall meetings at Sheepshead Bay, Brighton, Gravesend and Belmont Park been so liberally patronized, not only by eastern owners, but by prominent horsemen from both the western and northern racing circuits.
