

MAY BE ABLE TO GET OFF AT HIGH WATER

She Tried to Cross Under Sail and Met the Fate That Has Been Common to Ships Without Pilots and Tugs.

Observer Kelliher of the North Head weather station sighted a four-masted barkentine aground and flying distress signals on Clatsop spit this morning. He reported the matter, and a tugboat was dispatched from Astoria to assist her. The life-saving crew of Fort Stevens have also left for the scene.

It is stated that the craft is not lying in a bad position, and it is supposed that she will be able to get out into deep water at high tide this afternoon. Her identity has not been learned.

Clatsop spit is one of the most dangerous points at the mouth of the Columbia; the bones of many a sailing vessel ite bleaching on the sands there. It is stated that the barkentine in distress was trying to sail in over the bar, a procedure which usually ends in dissenter.

Early this morning a message was received at the local weather office from Point Adams stating that a four-master had attempted to cross the bar last evening and dropped anchor near Clatsop spit. An hour later about the same word came from Fort Canby, and this was immediately followed by a dispatch from Observer Kelliher that the vessel was ashore and flying signals of distress.

Storm warnings were shown this morning all along the coast from Tillamook to Port Townsend. Shortly after daylight the wind was blowing from the southeast at the rate of 44 miles an hour. By 10 o'clock it had subsided to 24 miles.

Another accident is reported this morning from San Francisco. While the schooner Sequola, lumber laden from the Columbia river, was entering the harbor she collided with the ship Charles E. Moody. The schooner had her spanker boom and gaff broken and the most of her rigging carried away.

GREAT SENSATION CAUSED BY CAMPAIGN GIFTS

Policy-Holders Indignant Over the Expenditure of Their Funds in Politics.

New York, Sept. 16.—The legislative insurance investigation committee has adjourned until next Wednesday. The adjourned until next wednesday. The admissions of campaign contributions made by insurance companies to the Republican party have caused the great-est sensation of the inquiry, and wide-spread criticism from indignant policy-holders is heard from all parts of the

holders is heard from all parts of the mation.

The damaging admissions made by witnesses and the revelations of the practices of high finance have confirmed in the mind of the public the complete alliance of the big insurance concerns with Wall street and exposed the manipulation of their funds to aid the operation of speculative syndicates formed by brokers.

Yesterday afternoon Vice-President Perkins of the New York Life stated that the contributions, approximating \$150.000, made to the Republican campaign funds in 1896, 1200 and 1904, made because Democratic success would jeopardize insurance interests, were "purely executive action," and had never been brought to the attention of the finance committee.

The contributions were made in the form of checks drawn in favor of J. P. Morgan & Co. for "convenience." . Perkins stated that other insurance concerns made similar contributions, and thought that the practice should be

forbidden.
