TO EXTEND ELGIN LINE TO REACH LEWISTON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 16.—Ranchers in the city yesterday from the Grand Ronde valley report a party of O. R. & N. engineers making a survey from the proposed extension from Elgin to a connection with the new line now being constructed to Lewiston and Paris. It is stated that members of the engineering party have stated the line will be extended to Lewiston as soon as the surveys can be completed and the contract awarded. The work in the Elgin section is under the supervision of Engineer E. C. Pollard, who until a few months ago was identified with the Northern Pacific engineering corps. The O. R. & N. Co. is now reported to be hiring all available men and teams in the Grand Ronde valley for the railroad work and promise the men steady employment in extending the road to the Lewiston connection.
