

HANGED IN HAUNTED WOOD

Body of Young Woman Found in Isolated Thicket Promises Sensational Mystery.

SKULL IS CRUSHED IN FINGER-MARKS ON NECK

Indications That She Was Killed After a Struggle and Carried to Place Where Discovered—Rings Were Torn From Fingers.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) New York, Sept. 16.—Lying at the foot of the Haunted Oak in an isolated thicket just off the Pelham road in the Bronx, the murdered body of a prepossessing young woman was found this afternoon.
