United States Prepared in Case of Serious Disturbance to Restore Order.

RIOTING NOT SERIOUS BUT MAY BECOME SO

Crisis Not Yet Reached but Is Expected Shortly—No Special Preparations Necessary—Army and Navy Ready to Act.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Washington, Sept. 23.—No orders to the army and navy are contemplated because of the election troubles in Cuba, but the higher officials here are keeping a watchful eye on the events now transpiring in that island.

From an authoritative source at the war department this statement was made today: No special preparations would have to be made by the department to deal with any situation that might arise in Cuba.

Acting Secretary of the Navy Darling and Admiral Converse, chief of the bureau of navigation, had a conference this morning but it was said to have no bearing on the Cuban matter.

Admiral Bradford's flagship, the Olympia, is at Guantanamo but it is explained that Admiral Bradford's recent activities have been in connection with San Domingo and not with Cuba.

The only advice received by the state department today regarding the disorder at Cienfuegos was a cablegram from Charge d'Affaires Sleeper at Havana, who confirmed the press dispatches.

SHIP LITTLE INJURED BY HER EXPERIENCE

Tug Astoria Grounds While Pulling Big Boat, but Floats Off—Electro and Tsooch Assist in the Rescue Work.
