Pears are still rather scarce and demand good at top values. Cold storage product is mostly in evidence.

Grapes from local points in better shape and Californias not so good. Price doing better. Tomatoes are rather dull today. Receipts are growing smaller and the rains are cracking most of the present arrivals.
