William J. Burns, Chief Secret Service Agent, Unearths Gigantic Conspiracy.

PROMINENT AND WEALTHY CITIZENS ARE INVOLVED

Police Officials and Customs House Officers Accused of Standing in With Ring of Smugglers-Com-ARE QUITE SEVERE posed of Influential Men.

Drop in Prices Occurs After an Early Advance-Smelter Gains a Trifle After a Big Rise-Metropol-

Seattle. Wash., Oct. 26.—Sensations greater than ever dreamed in connection with the Oregon land frauds are being developed in Washington, United States, state and ex-state officials, lumbermen and men of wealth, according to the evidence already gathered by a corps of 75 secret service agents, working Washington, are gullty of land frauds, both in timber and homestead, while police officials and custom officers will be charged with standing in with a ring of smugglers whereby the government was defrauded of thousands upon thousands of dollars in duties.

William J. Burns, the man in charge of the evidence in the Oregon land frauds, is in supervision of the work here under the personal direction of President Roosevelt, with whom he is in frequent telegraphic communication. Yesterday Burns called upon Mayor Ballinger and explained in outline what is being done, and secured for his men at work immunity from arrest, no matter at what time of day or night or in what position they might be found by the Seattle police officers. Each was furnished with a card which will free him if he should be so unfortunate as to fall into the clutches of any municipal authority.

Without making any mistake, a statement can be made that the land frauds here will exceed those of Oregon and involve more prominent men, several of whom are well known throughout the nation.

In the list against whom smuggling evidence is obtained are names of merknown in every city on the Pacific coast and many eastward. This traffic it can be stated has extended not only to opium but also to merchandise imported from foreign countries. Menwhose names are known as being in the list so far are principally residents of Seattle, Tacoma and Olympia with a few in eastern Washington.


