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WHEAT IS PRATIC IN CHICAGO

Bull Interest Allows Market to Take its Own Course During the Session of Today.

PRICES AN EIGHTH TO THREE EIGHTHS LOWER

Pit Influenced to Great Extent by Weakness in Minneapolis and Liverpool—Corn and Oats Dull—Bulls Best Buyers of Provisions.

People of Region Prepare for Active Campaign for Deep Water Channel.

EXPECT AID OF PEOPLE OF OREGON METROPOLIS

Depth of Water in Bay Is Now Twenty-Two Feet and No Improvement Work Done for Five Years Past.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Nov. 3.—"Forty feet of water for Coos bay." This has been adopted as the slogan of the Willamette Valley Development league, which met recently at Eugene, and which will convene November 11 at McMinnville, when the whole state will be fully represented and Coos bay will be the main theme.

With the advent of the railroad from Drain, which is now past doubt, the connecting link between Coos and the outside world will be forged, and the natural and geographic harbor of southern Oregon and northern California will be placed at the service of the vast county tributary to Coos bay.

Problem Is Simple.

The work of deepening Coos bay sufficiently to allow the largest vessels to come and go will have been performed by the government engineers to be one of the simplest of engineering problems.

Bar Is a Short One.

The bar proper is only about 300 yards across, with an almost sheer depth on either side of from 75 to 100 feet, and a single bar, the shortest on the coast and the easiest removed, is at present the only drawback to the harbor.

At a meeting of the Coos bay chamber of commerce Monday night definite arrangements were made for the sending of a strong delegation to the meeting of the league. Among the delegates are State Senator John S. Coker, Mayor Sengstack of Marshfield, Mayor Loggie, late delegate to the Trans-Mississippi Commercial congress, and James H. Flanagan of Flanagan & Bennett's bank of Marshfield.

HURLED HIGH IN AIR BY A DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

James Peek Killed and Ernest Hickson Badly Injured Near Vida.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Nov. 3.—By the explosion of a quantity of dynamite which they were throwing out, James Peek, aged 45 years, was killed and Ernest Hickson, aged 15, a son of Andy Hickson, was badly injured near the village of Vida, in the eastern part of Eugene, yesterday afternoon.

Peek and young Hickson, together with one or two other men, were engaged in blasting out stumps on the farm of Clarence Thompson, Russian, in the vicinity of Vida. Hickson was the driver of the blasting material they undertook to throw out some dynamite which had become frozen during the night. It got too hot and exploded without warning.

Peek and his boy, who were standing close by, were hurled into the air and the man's body was terribly mangled. The boy will probably recover.

TWENTY WHALES KILLED IN SUBMARINE BATTLE

(Journal Special Service.) Santa Barbara, Cal., Nov. 3.—Bodies of over 20 dead whales, known as "Bollers," are floating in the bay off Santa Cruz island, 30 miles from this city. The discovery was made by Walter Stanford, who has just returned to the islands in a launch. The significant corpse measured from 20 to 40 feet in length and bear mute evidence of a fierce battle between the monsters. This warfare has been going on between whales and swordfish for several weeks in the ocean near Channel island, and it is probable that in the extermination of so many of this variety of whales a signal victory has been won by some leviathans.
