Companies Did Not Comply.

The companies failed to complete the required sections within time limits, and you have so considered an extension of time for the Portland end of the line, and stipulated that it should be completed within 18 months of June 55, 1868, the date of passage of the act. In the original act of congress it had also been provided that the company should file its assent to the terms of the grant within one year.
