Rock work has been carried on as speedily as possible for the last week on the Northern Pacific's north bank line. The grading contractors who were assigned subcontracts by Sims & Shields are ready to begin work by sections all along the route from Vancouver to Kennewick. Men are being enlisted from all points in Pacific northwest territory to work on the grade. There are 26 subcontracts, and some of these probably will be sublet, dividing the work into 40 or 50 sections. The company within a few days will award the general contract for construction of the Lewiston-Grangeville line. The materials and suipment will be forwarded to the Northern Pacific terminus at Cul de Sac, and construction pushed from that end. Owing to the rough character of the country, and the deep canyons through which the route winds, transportation of heavy equipment would be next to impossible. Surveyors for the Northern Pacific have been unusually active on the peninsula the last week, running levels to determine finally the route for the new main line from the proposed Columbia river bridge to Portland, and for the location of the draw bridge to be built across the Willamette river. It is said that within a few days Chief Engineer Crosby will have surveyors at work on both banks of the Columbis, to determine the exact location of piers.
