The movement was started at a meeting yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the Concordia club. A dispatch had been received by Ben Selling from Jacob Schiff, treasurer of the national committees of relief, in which he said:

"We urge you and your associates to call a meeting of Jewish community to form branch committees and collect immediate funds. Necessities very great. Conditions appalling."
