HOTEL MANAGERS COMING NEXT

Hotel Men's Mutual Benefit Association of America to Hold Convention.

INCLUDES NEARLY ALL PROMINENT MANAGERS

Excursionists Will Come in Three or Four Special Trains and Various Special Car Parties, Probably in May and Be Portland's Guests.

Next year—probably in the month of May—the Hotel Men's Mutual Benefit Association of America will come to Portland on its annual excursion. The organization includes nearly every prominent hotel manager in the country. A leading hotel proprietor of New York city, writing to the Hotel World, says: "I have been asked several times what arrangements are being made for next year's trip to Portland. It seems that some people are anxious to know whether a circuitous route will be decided upon, as that, no doubt, would make it more interesting. Most people think more of California than they do of Portland, and unless the California trip were included it would be uninteresting to them."

Portlanders propose to make the hotel men's visit in this city next year so interesting that none of them ever again will talk in that strain. The association in former years has given annual excursions that took in California or Colorado resorts. The hotel men have acquired a fondness for the southern route because of the cordial treatment they have received at southern California hostilities. It will be the aim of Portland people to enlist their interest in the Pacific northwest. The Hotel World, replying to the New Yorker's letter, says:

"No person living east of the Mississippi river need hesitate about the trip to Oregon on the ground that it will be uninteresting or less interesting to go by one of the northern routes instead of the California route. Those who have never made the trip in the far northwest through Colorado or Idaho, or by way of St. Paul and Minneapolis, and the Northern Pacific or the Canadian Pacific, have not the slightest conception of what it is a store for them."

The World quotes from a letter received from a Cleveland man who came to Portland to see the exposition. He says: "You cannot tell anything about that country from the maps. They do not give you the slightest idea—the only way to comprehend it is to go and see it."

Without any disparagement of the beauties and attractions of California," says the World, "if the association or the different delegations decide to go to Portland through what is known as the northwestern country, they may rest assured they will never regret their experiences."

The excursionists will come in three or four special trains and various special car parties. There will be special trains from New York, Boston, Chicago and Memphis and New Orleans. They will probably come to the coast by one of the northern routes, and return by a southern route. The visitors will be guests of Portland several days.

GETS FIFTEEN DOLLARS ON MENELIK'S PEARLS
