Presenter, Or., Nov. 17.—The Peacock Milling company, which has one of the largest flouring mills in eastern Oregon, will shortly move its mill from its present site to the ground owned by them adjoining the Eagle mill, and other important improvements are under way.

The capacity of the Peacock and Eagle mills in 600 burrels per day, and about 1,200 cars of flows are, ashpued from this point each season. The company will pay out for wheat this season about 5005,804, the greater part of which will be left with the local growers. They will pay for labor \$10,800, and in addition to these sums they will spend several thousand deliars for other expenses. The business of the mill is better this season than ever before.

Datas, the Man With Marvelous Memory, Selle Right to Cut

Off His Head.

London, Nov. 17.—Datas, the "man with the marvelous memory," whose real name is J. A. Bottle, has just stened a contract which gives an American ductor, Carleman Simon of New Tork city, the right after the death of Datas to cut off his head and remove his brains, for a sum of \$19,000, Datas has already received part of the monar, and the remainder is to be paid to his widow at his death. One of the conditions of the contract is that Datas must report himself periodically to Dr. Simon during the remainder of his sife. He is 30 years old, and specialists have assured him that he cannot live beyond 35 years.

Medical experts calculate that Datas' brain weighs about 70 ounces, which is half a dozen ounces more than the heaviest known brain, that of Cuvier, the French naturalist.

A few years ago Datas was a stoker in a gas house, and was "discovered" by a well known comic singer, who afterward acted as his agent. Datas was talking with some friends on the subject of historical events, when the singer was struck by the wonderful acouracy and rapidity of his answers. The result was that the humble stoker was made an offer to give public exhibitions, and in a few weeks he became the most brilliant star in the world of memory men, and today he commands a salary of nearly \$1,000 a week.

SEVERE JOLT GIVEN TO CITY OWNERSHIP

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Ashland, Or., Nov. 17.—In the circuit court in Jacksonville yesterday Judge Hanna handed down a decision in the suit of the city of Ashland against the Ashland Electric Light & Power company in favor of the defendants. The city sought an injunction to restrain the electric company from setting additional poles to extend its lines within the city so as to connect with the Gold Ray line and thereby take current from the Gold Ray company whose plant is near Gold Hill.

The injunction was granted temporarily and then dissolved. The contention of the city was that the defendant company held no franchise and that the permission granted to erect poles could be revoked at any time upon reasonable notice.

Some months age the city voted bends for a municipal plant by a large majority and the council, which is strongly in favor of a municipal plant, sought to prevent a new line entering the city.
