## FIGHTERS WILL MEET AT CATCH WEIGHTS

### Both Men Have Trained Hard for the Encounter and There is Plenty of Money Behind Each Principal—Gardner Will Be Ruling Favorite

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—An event of more than usual importance in fistic circles is down for decision tomorrow evening at Woodward's pavilion. Jimmy Gardner, who is unquestionably the legitimate welter-weight champion of the world, will meet Mike (Twin) Sullivan, who has already fought him two hard draws. Both men have been training hard for it should be one of the best held here in months.

In his two appearances here, the first with Rufe Turner and the second with Buddy Ryan, Jimmy Gardner demonstrated one thing pretty conclusively, and that is that he is a fighter far above the average. During the four years that he has been in the game, he has not done as much mulling as many other fighters who are his inferiors, but what he has done has been of a sort to cheer the onlookers. As long ago as two years, George Siler and other competent Chicago critics picked him as a coming champion, and he has done nothing to change their belief since that time. To say that just at present he is one of the biggest attractions with the San Francisco crowd that can be had outside the charmed Britt-Nelson circle, is not stretching a point. The greeting accorded him when he was introduced at Woodward's recently at the Kaufmann-O'Brien contest was such as to indicate that he has found a warm spot in the hearts of the fans.

Sullivan, on the other hand, has made but one previous appearance in San Francisco. This was over a year ago, when he fought a 10-round preliminary with Joe Angell and won without much trouble. The Cambridge twins had been out the train not more than three or four days when he met Angell and had done no work of preparation to speak of. He was not in his best form and should not be judged on that showing.

But both are clamoring for a chance at Battlin' Nelson in a sounds night. It is doubtful if either the twin or Jimmy could make 133 after a week in a bake oven. Their best fighting weight is around 145 pounds, at which figure each will enter their next Friday night.

While no action was taken at the meeting of the board of supervisors yesterday regarding the fight permit, it is now virtually assured that both the Sullivan-Gardner battle, which is down for decision Friday night, and the Fitts-O'Brien imbroglio, which should be decided in the next few days, will be allowed to go on. Morris Levy, who is promoting the first contest, has secured the signatures of 10 members of the board, and Eddie Graney, who is looking out for Crawford's interests, has 10 signatures granting a permit for December. While this proceeding is not regular, it is equivalent to the granting of the permit in an open meeting of the board, and the fight hardly can be expected to be either promoter in pulling off his show.
