HEPPNER CIRCUIT COURT ENDS BUSY TERM

Plaintiffs in Suit Against Oregon Land & Water Company Awarded Damages.

Heppner, Or., Nov. 25.—Circuit court has adjourned here after a very busy week's term. The most hotly contested case before the court was an action brought by Sarsh C. Jennings and others against the Oregon Land & Water company for damages to the extent of \$8,000. The trouble came up over the construction of a hotel building at Irrigon. The Jennings were to creet a hotel, and in return the Oregon Land & Water company, by F. B. Holbrook, was to deed to them some lots. The Wind River Lumber company furnished the lumber, and after the Jennings had run out of money they plastered a mechanic's lies on the building and foreclosed, thus throwing the owners of the building out.

Holbrook refused to deed the land until the building was completed. The suit was given a jury trial, and after two days' fighting in court was submitted to the jury at 9 o'clock last night, and a verdict was rendered at 2 o'clock this morning, giving the plaintiffs \$2,200 damages. The plaintiffs were represented by Tweedy and Woodsom of this place, while the defendant was represented by Munly and Kollock of Portland.
